## INVESTIGATION IS BEGUN.

The Committee Meet and Hear Law's Evidence in Full.

## LAW RE-TELLS HIS STORY.

He implicates Sloan, and Gives Details of the Trap Set for McCune—He Confides in Johnson & Smith—Rules Adopted for Proceedings.

The evidence of Representative Law was given before the investigating committee today. It is an amplification of the sensational charges he made last Saturday to the joint assembly, that Mr. McCune had sought to bribe his vote. The evidence does not go so much to what he has already given, but corrects two statements he made on the floor of the House in relation to the witness Pratt. His testimony implicates R. W.
