High School Dance—The associated cadet officers of the Salt Lake High school will meet on the 15th inst., to arrange for a dancing party.

Weather Man in Vernal—Section Director J. J. Watt, who left for Vernal on a tour of inspection, to be absent a week.

Prize Fruit Story—Frank Hewlett writes from Payette, Ida., that the fruit trees there are so heavily loaded that one orchardist alone has had to expend \$250 for lumber with which to prop up the boughs of his trees.

C. D. Willcutt Resigns—Chief Clerk C. D. Willcutt to General Supt. Clemens of the Bell Telephone company, has resigned, and will move to Los Angeles, as he finds his health is likely to be seriously impaired by this high altitude.

C. A. Quigley Goes East—Manager C. A. Quigley of the Studebaker company left yesterday for South Bond, Ind., to be in attendance on an annual meeting of representatives of the company for general consultation. He will be away three weeks.

DR. SHORT STILL IN THE LIMELIGHT

Uncalled for Assertions Against Salt Lake City Move Citizens to Protest.

M. AND M. DIRECTORS TALK

Sentiment That Rash Statements Should Not Be Allowed to Pass Unchallenged—Ought to Boost.

The uncalled for assertions made in Cincinnati last Sunday by Rev. F. B. Short of the First Methodist church in this city, are stirring up things here. Secretary Haddock of the M. & M. association says:

"If Dr. Short is correctly quoted, all I can say is that his statement is a lie. It is not true. Things of that sort have a very injurious effect upon the city's prospects and ought not to be allowed to pass unchallenged. It is such misrepresentations in the past that aroused so much prejudice in the east not only against Salt Lake, but against the entire state of Utah, and which we have to work so hard to remove. The effect upon prospective investors is very bad, to say the least. People with families are certainly not going to come to a city to make their homes which they believe to be as bad as Dr. Short is trying to make out. Even if the statements were true, they ought not to be made, and they certainly are not true. If the Methodist Episcopal mission people are paying his expenses through the east to make such statements as he has credited with making, they are as bad as he is. Every commercial organization in the city ought to take the matter up and see to it that a denial of the statement is sent east. Every organization in the state ought to take it up. I think the directors of the M. & M. should act. Several of the directors talked to me about the matter yesterday, and I think they will give it consideration."

O. H. Hewlett says: "The effect of it is very harmful. We, here, of course, know that the statements are not true, but the people of the east have been hearing these things for years and they have their effect. Every commercial organization in the city ought to take the matter up and see to it that a denial of the statement is sent east. Every organization in the state ought to take it up. I think the directors of the M. & M. should act. Several of the directors talked to me about the matter yesterday, and I think they will give it consideration."
