A GRAVE DANGER.

It is really strange that in this country where no religious test for office is required, politicians insist on appealing to religious prejudices, against opponents. Especially are such appeals strange when resorted to in the election of a Chief Executive of the Nation, who, in his office, belongs to no church, no party, but to the entire people.

REGISTER TOMORROW. Getting your name on the registration books isn't an act for which compensation comes as in the thrill of pulling the favorite lever on election day, but nevertheless, the act is demanded of every man and woman as evidence of an interest in their citizenship.

Ministers of all denominations in Ohio, it is said, are seriously considering the election from a doctrinal point of view. INDIAN DIALECTS. No less than eighty-nine different Indian dialects have been recorded for preservation by experts of the University of California.
