Canadian Voyagers.—Ottawa, 27.—The Governor General has been ordered by the home government to secure the services of 500 Canadian voyagers to go up the Nile to the mouth of the Atbara at Khartoum. The voyagers will be sent in 100 boats, and will leave Quebec the 15th of September. It is expected that 250 will be from the Saguenay district, and the remainder from Quebec and St. Maurice regions.
