HIS TOWN HAS LOTS OF ROOM.

People Rejoice Over Completion of West Cache Canal, Which Irrigates 30,000 Acres.

Brigham H. Hendricks of Lewiston. Cache county, is one of the three repre-sentatives of the Second legislative district in the state legislature. Mr. Hendricks was born in Salt Lake City 42 years ago, and is a son of W. D. Hendricks, one of the planeers of the northern country, and a member of the Mor-mon battalion. The elder Hendricks was also probably the first contractor on public works in this city, and has been successful in railroad contracing

on public works in this city, and has been successful in railroad contracting work for more than a generation. The subject of this sketch moved to Coche valley with his parents 40 years ago, and for years has been a resident of Lewiston the northwestern town in the state. For the past two years Mr, Hendricks has been one of the county commissioners of his home county, and during his term of office had the satisfaction of assisting in building a \$20,000 addition to the coun-ty courthouse, as well as reducing the county debt about \$14,000. At the end of his term, expiring Dec. 31, 1906, the bonded indebtedness of Cache county was only \$1,000, when there was in the treasury of the county more than \$3,-000, or more than enough to pay off the county indebtedness, and that with a levy of only 7 mills. That Mr, Hendricks is a level-head-ed, conservative man of affairs was evi-dently recognized by the speaker in his make-up of the claims and public accounts committee, but he was named as vice-chairman of the appropria-tions committee, and was given assign-ments on such important committees, as those on agriculture and horitcul-ture, and highways and bridges. "Our county is prosperous," said Mr. Hendricks, today. "Our horses and cat-tle, as shown by the records of the state board of equalization, are assessed higher than in any other section of the state. ### SPECIAL TAXES. Property Owners Are Puzzled Over the Notices for Sidewalk Extensions.

Many property owners who have re-ceived notices of special taxes against their property for sidewalks or other improvements are somewhat puzzled over the provision which is printed in red ink across the face of the notice. It reads as follows: "If not paid in full when the first installment becomes due, interest-bearing scrip will be issued which will be a lien against the pronwhich will be a lien against the propwhich will be a lien against the prop-erty." On nearly all improvements the prop-erty owner may have five years in which to pay the tax, the payments be-ing in six installments and when the first installment becomes due the prop-erty owner has the privilege of paying the entire amount of the tax and thus save the interest; but if he chooses to may for it in installments, then the dity
