GERMANY AND THE TRUST QUESTION.

Debate in Diet on Purchase of
Hibernia Coal Co. Shares
Brings it Up.

EXAMPLE OF UNITED STATES.

It is Cited as a Warning—No Such
Experiments Wanted in the
Fatherland.

Berlin, Nov. 30.—In the Prussian diet the last two days have been devoted to an animated debate on the bill appropriating \$17,500,000 to take over the shares of the Hibernia Coal company which the Dresden bank bought on behalf of the Prussian government. The bill passed its first reading and was referred to a committee.

Herr Moeller, minister of commerce and industry, was subjected to a sharp attack by Von Eyern, one of the National Liberal leaders, who is a member of the Hibernia Coal company's directorate, for the secretive way in which the purchase of the stock was conducted.

Minister Moeller explained that when the great movement for the consolidation of the iron companies with the great coal companies of West Germany was begun he pointed out to Freiherr von Rheinbaben, minister of state and of finance, that the state must act immediately if it ever intended to secure a coal property entitling it to a seat in the coal syndicate, where it could watch developments on behalf of the public interest. The two ministers decided to give a commission to the Dresden bank to buy the Hibernia company shares. The minister deprecated the idea that he was hostile to great consolidations of capital. On the contrary, he said, the changed conditions of the age made great organizations necessary. It was only necessary to find the right form of organization and men to be placed at their head, who would remember that they must act in the public interest and not in the exclusive interest of capital. The minister then dipped into the trust question as it exists in the United States, and warned Germany against copying the American system.

"For several years," he said, "we in Europe were under the spell of those powerful American organizations. We believed the Americans had discovered the philosophy of trust. After time had elapsed and we observed what had become of those trusts we were in a position to regard them more calmly. We Germans were most dazed by the greatness of the steel trust. What shape did matters take with that concern? In order to effect an organization it was compelled to resort to crazy over-capitalization."

Minister Moeller, continuing, said the iron works had been capitalized to double, to three-fold and finally ten-fold their actual value, and that the company is no longer master of the competitive situation in its own country. Its management of prices caused new works to be established which were better equipped than the older ones and were producing greater and cheaper methods. The steel trust, he continued, controlled only 40 per cent of the country's production, against 70 or 80 per cent at the start.

"Against such perilous experiments," the minister concluded, "may Germany be preserved."

CITIZENS' INDUSTRIAL ASSOCIATION WORK.

New York, Nov. 30.—At the second day's session of the Citizens' Industrial association, Wallace Downey, president of the New York Metal Trades association, said that he was proud of what has been done for the "open shop" in the east. He said: "In its fight the Metal Trades association has won all the strikes without the sacrifice of principles. Our employees have admitted that they were mistaken and we were right. 'I am not an enemy of labor,' he said."

continued, "and I want every laboring man to get fair play. Labor unions have as much right to exist as your organization. Every one knows that the prevailing rate of wages and the eight-hour labor law have done serious damage, and I am glad that it has been declared unconstitutional. It drives business to other states; I am in favor of eight hours, but I want at the same time to work as long as I like. I am in favor of paying the highest rate of wages and giving the shortest work day."

James A. Emony, counsel of the Citizens' Alliance of San Francisco, told of the system of organization on the Pacific coast. He said that in San Francisco labor was so well organized that they had unions of the chicken pickers, ten pin men and the sandwich men.

On the report of the nominating committee, David M. Parry of Indianapolis was re-elected president of the Citizens' Industrial association. J. C. Craig of Denver was elected first vice president; Maj. A. C. Rosecrance of Evansville, Ind., treasurer. It was in the employment bureau of the country that Frederick W. Job, secretary of the Chicago Employers' association, found hope of a future settlement of all troubles between employers and employees. To that bureau he declared both sides must return in the end to find relief.

John Beattie, a representative of the Master Painters and Decorators' association, speaking of the labor situation in New York said:

"I do not want you to think that the men of New York are held up with strings willingly or lack and. We have in this city an organization that has successfully fought the labor unions. We organized our association 18 months ago and made a strong fight. We formed an alliance with labor after a lockout lasting 16 weeks, which paralyzed business. Recently I asked President Roosevelt as an American citizen to use his influence to put the responsibility on labor unions and he said 'That's the thing that is needed.'"

The report of the committee on resolutions which was adopted, re-affirmed the objects as adopted at the Chicago and Indianapolis conventions, the Citizens' Industrial convention and again declares for:

"The open shop. Demanding only good faith and fair dealing, it discriminates against neither union nor independent laborer."

"The freedom of the apprentice and the right of the individual to have a trade and follow it."

"The right of private contract, with equal obligation upon employer and employee."

"The right to work, limiting the hours of labor, whether of hiring or of the hand, is a matter of mutual agreement, not a subject for arbitrary legislative enactment."

"The enforcement of the law."

The resolutions direct that the executive committee take the necessary steps to secure a proper channel of activity for the co-relation of interested
