

## TELEGRAPHIC, FROM BULWAYO.

The Number Of Rebels Increasing  
Around The Town.

DYNAMITE KILLS FOUR MEMPHIS.

Cultivators in London—New Troops Is-  
sued—Dispatched to South Africa.

BULWAYO, April 28.—So far as the  
situation is improved here over that of yesterday, it is due to the departure of the rebels, who have been massed at the north of the town for several days, and from which an attack has been al-  
most daily experienced.

The situation, however, seems little changed to those in Bulwyo. The capital, indeed, in which the rebels quelled their previous victories, has suffered a small plauge of trouble. There is no doubt that they were stirred Friday by the demonstration of the power of British troops from Bulwyo against their vainglorious antagonists. That plauge was driven back upon the main body, the patrols and the like prove basis within recent days of new mounting numbers of rebels.

The directions taken by this unusual body of British troops after quitting the position to the north has not been known, but it is known the purpose of the movement is to cut off the communication with the rebels in the Matabeleland and also cover a junction to the southwest. The road through the low hills to the south of Bulwyo is now closed, and the rebels are said to be forty miles from here, at which distance the road reaches the Matopos pass. This singular and precipitous descent is still, most likely, held. It is an exact reproduction of the one made by the rebels when they took the heights of the Matopos, but for some reason, if allowed to get into the hands of the rebels, it would be extremely difficult and perhaps impossible to dislodge them with any force at all. The rebels are said to be in the vicinity of Bulwyo, apparently out of Gwelo, or Bulwyo with the outside world. To hold the pass and to patrol the road between it and Bulwyo, measures which are to be expected, are being taken for the safety of the place, requires a large proportion of the available forces, less than a thousand men in garrison. The threatened movement of the enemy upon the line of communication has added to the problem of how best they can further divide Bulwyo's defences. It is to guard the road. The task of verifying as to the whereabouts of the immediate destination of the rebels must of necessity bring us over the town again much dread and anxiety.

LAWTON, April 28.—Authorities report here that Bulwyo is about to be surrounded and threatening that place continue to increase as they now form a formidable force. As a measure of defense against the expected attack upon the town, British authorities have decided to hold the rebels in the ground, over which an attacking party would necessarily approach. These forces have been well equipped with instruments in the nature of a fort, which will be ready to repel any assault of whatever kind. In the central region the ground in which the rebels have been held is in full view and the rebels can be easily seen by day, so the movement requires no secret. An urgent call for reinforcements has been sent to the various garrisons, and the orders given are that the forces will do their best to sustain them.

CONFIDENCE IN LONDON.  
London, April 28.—The offices of the Chamber of South African ministers are persistently representing that the rebellion at Bulwyo is not as serious as represented by unoffical dispatches and that the town is not in imminent danger.

The Daily News says that military authorities believe that the appointment of General Carrington, British commander-in-chief, who has been ordered to the Cape, will put an end to the British forces in Matabeleland, as a measure of protection, and that it will probably be followed by the departure of some troops. The war office is holding an adjournment, the Daily News con-

siders, "and placing stores in readiness for their transports."
