Chicago, Dec. 7.—The police today established the fact that arsenic had been swallowed by Mrs. Rose Vzral mother of the family in which six suspicious deaths have recently oc-curred. An analysis revealed the presence of arsenic in the body and the makers of the embalming fluid which was used after the death of Mrs. Vzral have proven to the au-thorities that it contained no arsenic. It is not yet established whether the woman took arsenic or whether it was administered by another per-son.

## MEAT PRODUCTS.

Two Hundred and Fifty Million Dol-

lars' Worth Exported Last Year, Washington, Dec. 7.—According to a statement issued today by the bu-reau of statistics of the department of commerce and labor, more than \$250,000,000 worth of meat and dairy \$230,000,000 worth of meat and daily products will have passed out of the United States into the markets of other parts of the world in the year ending with the present month. This total is made up of a little over \$200.total is made up of a fittle over 4 000,000 worth of meats, \$25,000,000 worth of cattle and about \$10,000,000 worth of butter, cheese and milk. No feature of the export trade in agricul-tural products has shown a more steady and rapid growth than that of meat and dairy products of which there was an increase of about 60
