#### ' MARBLE DEPOSITS.

Charles A. Hyde and eight associates are warking three men at their h acquired marble beds some tw twelve miles from Woodside on the Rio Grande Western rallway, in the Cedar mountains, being in the north of Emery coun-ty. They have 2,500 acres on which asessment work has been done w the past year. These beds are in the side of a hill, about 500 feet above the level of a desert and to which a wagon road is to be constructed the present summer. #### OIL AND COAL LANDS.

County Surveyor H. W. Damon has een down around Farnham on the Ric Grande Western railroad the better part of two weeks, where he has rul lines on about seven sections of land for B. R. McDonald and associates, who have here some splend d indications of petroleum. Locations are to be filed as soon as the surveys and plats are com-pleted. A few miles beyond there is another association of men at work, which takes the locations on almost to Green River station, where the Walker Bros and other Salt Lakers have hundreds o laims staked off, and where it is said a boring plant will soon be put in to test the ground. Beyond the Green River fields, acording to H. G. Ballard, the Thompson Springs merchant and stock man, the country is staked for miles and the locations came up almost to his town, some seventy to eight miles from Price to the east. Between Price and Green River there have been numerous coal filings with the oil excitement, hundreds upon hundreds of acres being filed upon. As Scofield private parties are surveying 20,000 acres of coal while north of Price the Gilson-Milne combination are expecting government surveyors at any time to give them their correct lines on about 10,000 acres where they have a good grads of an-thracite, coking, steam and domestic South of Huntington within the past month several thousand acres of coal lands have been acquired during the last thirty days by outsiders.
