Washington, April 17.—Injunction against the enforcement of state laws can only be issued by a majority of three federal judges who are to pass upon them if a bill that passed the senate today becomes a law. The bill was drafted in the judiclary commit-tee from a number of measures under consideration. It was reported by Senator Overman and its provisions were explained by him to the senate. A substitute by Senator Burkett was dis-agreed to. The Overman bill was op-posed by Mr. Heyburn on the ground that the great distances between the federal courts in the west would oper-ate to delay the granting of necessary injunctions. Senator Knox favored the passage of the bill and opposed Mr. Heyburn's ar-

### CHICAGO IS TO HAVE A TWENTY-STORY HOTEL

Chicago, April 15.—It is now virtu-al gasured thot Chicago is to have a new 20 story hotel. It is to be located at the northwest corner of Michigan avenue, and Hubbard court, and is to be called "The Blackstone" after the late Timothy B. Blackstone" after the late Timothy B. Blackstone, for many years president of the Alton railroad, whose old homestead it will occupy. It is to be erected by the Drake Hotel company, and will be under the direct management of John Brake Jr., son of the late John B. Drake, former proprie-tor of the Grand hote! The hotel will contain 442 guest rooms together with other features which are expected to give it a distinction among the hotels of the city. Its cost is placed at \$1,500,000 and it is said the building will be completed by Oct. 19, 1909.

Washington, April 17.—The attitude of Emperor William and the Berlin court toward David Jayne Hill, named by the president to be ambassador at that capital, was the subject of com-ment in the house of representatives today during consideration of the dip-jomatic and consular bill. Both Mr. Perkins of New York and Mr. Slayden of Texas expressed the opinion that objections to Mr. Hill were due to no other cause than that Mr. Hill was financially unable to maintain a cer-tain standard of social representation. Each of them condemned the practisa which, they said, had grown up of se-lecting men of great wealth to be the nation's diplomatic representatives abroad, and urged, as a means of coun-teracting the effect of such a policy, the housing of our diplomats in build-ings owned by the government, and the allowance to them of salarles suf-ficient to enable them to maintain the dignity of their high office.
