WORK BEING PUSHED RAPIDLY ON PINE CANYON \$3,000,000 SMELTER

"PUTTING IN FOUNDATION FOR SMELTER WAREHOUSE. THE SAME PLACE ONE MONTH LATER.

HAT the International Smelting I & Refining company intends to push its smelter in Pine canyon through to completion in record time is shown by the way the buildings are now going up at the site. The sicel for the first building on the grounds is now up. The upper picture represents the same building a month ago. The lower picture of month ago. The lower picture shows the steel as it looks today.

This big steel building was a part of the old Highland Boy smelter build-ing A part of the building was cut of and arranged for the building now being erected. The present structure is 4 by 466 feet and will accommodate the shops, warehouse and office for the big snielter plant.

To the left, of the building! as seen in the picture, is the transformer sta-tion where the big power house of the company is to be erected. The steel for the building is now arriving, and a greater part of it is already on the ground

Some of the steel for the sampling mill and some for concentrator building is now on the way and will arrive at the smelter site within a few weeks. This with what is already there will keep the contractors hustling to keep out from under.

Bricks are already arriving for the stack: This alone will take in neighborhood of 5.009,000 or 6,000,000 big- stack. blicks. Local companies have been blidling for this job, and one of the Sait Lake brickmakers has been awarded the contract.

At Townsite as the new addition to Tooele city is called, the Tooele val-ley railroad is building a fine station and warehouse. The foundation has been completed and the frame work

been completed and the frame work has been started. The building will be of pressed brick and built for the ac-comodation of a city of 5.000 persons. About the new station the houses are growing as if by magic. Within the past two months houses have been go-ing up at the rate of two and three a week. A new \$40,000 hotel is now being constructed and a number of boarding houses and restaurants are now operating.

A gam-bler who was playing euchre for \$5 a game on a Mississipp; packet had two red jack strippers in the pack so that he was certain of holding both bowers on every deal when the trump was red; yet Green tells us he lost 35

straight games playing against a man who knew nothing whatever about cheating.

History records some extraordinary instances of persons high in the social scale who were so addicted to sure thing betting that it resembled the so thing betting that it resembled the so-called kleptomania of modern times. It is related, for instance, that a former Marquis of Waterford was continually on the watch for chances to fleece his acquaintances by means of wagers on which he could not lose. One of his tricks was to cause his sitting room in the hotel to be so over-heated that one or other of his visitors would be sure to rush to a window to

sitting room in the noter to be so over-heated that one or other of his visitors would be sure to rush to a window to open it, upon which the marquis would appear to be greatly alarmed, assert-ing that he had been warned not to open any of the windows on that side of the hotel because it would throw a certain crockery dealer opposite into fits, in which he would probably smash everything in his place. Of course such a statement was re-ceived with incredulity and bets were easily made upon the result of the opening of the window. The result was always as the marquis had farefold, the explanation being that he had pri-vately arranged the matter with the shopkeeper in advance. It appears that a certain English Lord H., who knew the weakness of the marquis, succeeded in beating him at his own game. Lord H. had invited

remarked, "Let us see where we can spread these cards out," and turning around approached a table, upon which he laid the pack, face down, asking you to shuffle it.

to shuffle it. This done, he asked you to spread the pack, as you would in cutting for partners at bridge, he never touching the cards at all. He was then willing to bet you any amount that he could make you draw the eight of clubs by holding your left hand

wholding your left hand. When you had lost the bet he would ask you to turn over the cards, would ask you to turn over the cards, and you would then find that the whole pack was made up of eights of clubs and nothing else, these cards having been substituted for the pack from which you cut while he was turning around to approach the table. About 25 years ago there was a very clever sure thing gambler trav-cling through the west who made a great deal of money in a very short time by betting on the spelling of a word. Of course he worked the thing up well.

He appeared to be a traveling He appeared to be a traveling salesman and he would pick out some liekly looking victim on a train and sit next to him or engage a man in conversation in the writing room of a hotel.
