Last Night's Dispatches.

NEW YORK, 25.—The New York
stock market closed last night at
Richmond, Staten Island.

The fortieth anniversary of the
Board of Missions of the Protestant
Episcopal Church in New York City,
St. Anne's church, with the Rev.
Samuel C. C. McClellan, Bishop of
Michigan, presiding. There were
delegates present from almost every
diocese in the United States.

The first of the annual reports was
that of the domestic committee, in-
cluding that of the Indian commis-
sion, which is in substance as fol-
lows:

The missionary year ending be-
tween October, 1874, and October,
1875, has been one of great pros-
perity than its beginning could have
been reasonably expected.

There has been an increase in the
number of missionaries, and the total
number of missionaries is now
\$14,000, and of a little more than
this amount for special purposes.

The addition early in the year of
four new missionaries, and the mis-
sionary bishops provided for by the
general convention in October last
is regarded as an advance of more
than ordinary significance in the
past direction of the work.

Call for more clergymen, coming
up from all parts of the country, is
not made with an adequate re-
sponse, as there seems to be a falling
off in the number of young men of-
fering themselves as candidates for
the ministry. Various causes are
given for this, but the most impor-
tant is assumed to be that the
clergy are not properly supported,
which, by interpretation, means
that the world pays better than the
church.
