GREAT BRITAIN.

A Dental by Granville.

LONDON, 3.—It is reported that

Earl Granville has sent Count Von

Armin an explicit assurance that,

as far as he is concerned, there is

no foundation for the statement

inquired about by Sullivan in the

House of Commons, March 30th,

that the British Government had

proposed granting the appointment

of the Count as ambassador to En-

gland on account of his untruthful-

ness, highbrowed and the late

Government officials using any

such language as that.

The Budget.

The budget, as submitted by the

Chancellor of the Exchequer, esti-

mated the expenditures for the fi-

scal year ending March 31st 1877,

at £28,000,000, and the revenue at

£27,200,000; the Chancellor pro-

posed an increase of a penny in the

stamp duty on the income tax, which

will result in a surplus of £285,000.

The Royal Titles Bill in the House.

In the House of Lords last night,

the Earl of Shaftesbury offered his

motion for an address to the Queen,

praying her Majesty not to assume

the title of Empress of India.

The title was distasteful to the

vast majority of the people, and

made a point that after the recent

assassination of the Emperor of

India, the title would be an in-

jury to the Queen. Lord Carnar-

von opposed and Lord Selborne

supported the motion. The debate

lasted about an hour, and was

closed by a vote of 137 to 91. The royal title

will then pass through committee.

Cave's Report.

Cave's report shows that Egypt

has suffered much from the disas-

terous and pestilential effects of

the Khedive's Government, with

the intention of raising enough

capital to pay the floating debt,

made a law enabling him to

commute the land tax on terms

which entailed a sacrifice of half the

revenue from this source for all

time, for the sake of obtaining

only sufficient to pay the interest

on the floating debt. The Egyptian

revenue, which now produces about

\$35,450,000, will, after 1880, be

the operation of the above law, less

an annual sum of \$1,500,000. The

normal expenditure is about \$45,

450,000, over half of which is de-
