Phileman was baptized in Carthage, Il., March 14, 1838. At Nau-voo, then Commerce, he met his wife and companion until death. Sister Merrill is about three years older than her husband, and though rather delicate, survives him. In January, 1841 Phileman departed on his first mission in Wisconsin, Sub-sequently he filled several important missions among the most prominent

missions, among the most prominent was that of being a member of the Mormon Battallon. In his early man-hood Bro, Merrill was associated with the Prophet Joseph Smith, and was his body guard on several occasions. He has been a great preacher in his day, and among the most interesting fea-tures of his discourses is a recital of the many incidents of the life of our Prophet and Patriarch, Joseph and Hyrum Smith.

After his honorable release from the battalion from duty in California, he proceeded to the east and joined his wife and three small children, whom he left on the plains when the flower of the camp of Israel was selected to fight the battles of their country with Mex-ico. #### Weekly Crop Bulletin and Weather Report.

U. S. Department of Agriculture.Ida. ho section, Climate and crop service, weather bureau. Weekly crop bulletin for the week ending Monday, Sept. 19, 1904:

#### WEATHER.

The weather continued warm over the entire state, averaging about 5 de-grees above the normal over western counties. Light frost occurred in a few eastern sections on the 14th. No rain fell, except a light sprinkle in eastern sections on Sunday night. The sky remained clear, light smoke prevalling in western counties.

#### CROPS.

Fruit .- Shipping of pears and prunes and drying of prunes is progressing rapidly; over the northern portion of the state the yield of fruit has been nearly an average one, prunes being a large crop; in the fruit growing val-leys of southwestern Idaho the yield of peaches, apples and prunes is generally above average, peaches beings especially plentiful; the yield of pears is somewhat below average; where fruit is grown in eastern sections, the yield is generally somewhat below average, except in portions of Bannock county, where a good yield has been secured. Most of the fruit, except winter apples and late peaches, is ma-Grain .- Harvest of grain is practical-

ly complete and most of it has been threshed; in northern counties the yield is somewhat below average on account of drouth, but the quality is excellent: in southwestern sections the quality of the product is excellent and the yield is a good average; in eastern countles the yield is average and above and the quality is generally excellent except that in a few elevated sections some of it has been injured by frosts; grasshoppers dld some damage in Bear

Lake county: corn has yielded well. Grass.-Most of the hay grop has been cut, egcept that in a few southwest-ern valleys some third-crop alfaifa is yet to be secured; the yield of hay in northern countles is slightly below average, but the quality is good; in southern and eastern sections, bountiful yields have generally been secured and the quality is excellent; some second crop alfalfa in eastern sections has been slightly frosted. Range grass is now very short and is needing rain

Vegetables and Melons .- The yield of potatoes is somewhat uneven, but re-ports indicate that general results will be below the average, with quality excellent; garden vegetables have done well throughout the season; sugar beets have prospered, and a good yield will soon be gathered; melons have yielded well and markets are well supplied with watermelons and canteloups of excellent quality.

Stock .- Stock kept on Irrigated pastures has done well throughout the season and is now in excellent condition; range cattle and sheep are beginning to come in from the hills and are in good condition; shipping of sheep continues active.
