Salt Lake Boy Reclaims Lake **Bed and Grows the Finest** Grain in The State.

HAS RANCH OF 18,000 ACRES.

### Gratifying Success Attending the Efforts of Hyrum Z. Clawson And Associates.

Hyrum Z. Clawson, nephew of Hyrum B. Clawson, the well known Utah pioneer, is here from California after an absence of 20 years. Mr. Clawson was born in this city in 1858, but at the age of 15 became possessed of a desire to "see the world" and drifted west to Ten years later he returned "to see the folks," and now he is here again for the same purpose Since going to California Mr. Clawson has become one of the agricultural plllars of the golden state, being part owner of a ranch of over 18,000 acres in Kings county, on the old bed of the Tulare lake. A great part of the ranch is devoted to the growing of grain, from which the owners derive an abundant harvest each year.

Mr. Clawson is a son of the late John R. Clawson and Mrs. Lucinda Dodge and for two weeks past has been visiting with his mother in this city. While he still has great love for the old home notes many changes since first 1 left it and returns now practical stranger among many old-time frie However, he has enjoyed his visit promises to come again as often pusiness conditions will permit.

### GREAT GRAIN COUNTRY.

Of central California, where he and companions have made a comfortable competence in agricultural pursuits Mr. Clawson speaks in the highest terms. The country is admirably adapted to the growing of grain, and last year the Barbour & Clawson ranch produced more series the last year the Barbour & Clawson ranch produced more grain than any other ranch in the state. The property is located about 20 miles south of Han-ford, in King's county, and only a few years ago was entirely covered by wa-ter. In 1899 and 1900, Messrs. Bar's bour & Clawson, with several others, went to this lake and reclaimed in the matcherbood of 10,000 pares since ne shorhood of 10,000 acres, dince which time many other districts have been formed, until now about 60,000

been formed, until now about 60,000 acres of this land are reclaimed. The past year Barbour & Clawson farmed something in excess of 13,000 acres, which, up to the time rust struck the grain, hore the promise of a crop that would have probably been the rec-ord breaker of the state, as it promised 20 to 30 sacks per acre; but in this lo-cality, as in nearly all sections of the state, rust cut down this yield to about one-quarter.

quarter, harvesting this grain the past season the largest harvesting plant in the world was used, consisting of six of the Daniel Best Manufacturing Co.'s steam combined harvesters, and two of Holt Bros.' These machines cut, thrash and sack from 500 to 1,000 sacks per day each, each sack containing about two and one-third bushels.

the western coast, as just stated, was quite disappointing. Nevertheless, Bar-bour & Clawson harvested something in excess of 70,000 sacks, which is said to have been the most grain harvested on any one ranch in the state of California the past year.

LAKE BED RECLAIMED.

Tulare lake 30 to 40 years ago was the largest body of fresh water west of the Mississippi river, at which time it was 70 miles long and 40 miles wide, but has gradually been filling up with sediment, which is carried into it by its segment, which is carried into it by its inlet—Kings river. In the past 20 years there have been numerous ditches taken from this river, and since that time the lake has been gradually growing smaller, until at the present time it barely covers to exceed two townships during the wet season, and this water is only from a few inches townships during the wet season, and this water is only from a few inches to two feet deep. The soil, being a sedimentary deposit, is without doubt as rich as any to be found in the world, and, being very level and vary-ing not to exceed from 5 to 20 inches per mile, it is ideal for large-scale ag-ricultural operations. ricultural operations,

The levees around the ranch are six feet high and 30 feet wide, and are considered ample to prevent the water from encroaching upon this land. Bar-bour & Clawson and Mr. Blakeley sev-eral years ago also took out ditches, and at the present time own the con-trolling interests in these ditches, which are used to irrigate the lands.

### FARMING IMPLEMENTS USED.

As an illustration of the plant that As an illustration of the plant that is necessary to carry on such extensive farming, it would give one not ac-qualitied with the machinery an idea to state that these harvesters cost \$8,500 each, besides which the water tanks, the oil tanks, the cook houses, plows, harrows, drills, etc., cost a great deal, and it is hardly necessary to say that a large capital is necessary, and that this season Barbour & Clawsoo had from 50 to 200 head of horses and mules constantly employed, with a force of from 25 to 100 men; that work never stops throughout the year; that as soon as the harvesting is over and the grain drawn to the warehouses ditch building, levee building and sow-ing for the next season begin. ing for the next season begin.
