IN DEATH'S GRASP.

*Colonel Sherman Passes Away Quietly.
Sedation Was the Cause.*

THE GENERAL PREDICTED THE DEATH TWO WEEKS AGO.

*To President, the Cabinet, His Colleagues and Many Others Express Their Sympathy.**No Sympathy in the News.*GENERAL SHERMAN'S DEATH.—
Mourning the Dead.*New York, Feb. 14.—The following official statement of the news as received by the Associated Press from General Sherman and the arrangements for his funeral are given by Lieutenant Field:**General Sherman lay in bed from yesterday evening until he died today without speaking a word. He made no efforts to stir or move, and was unable to stir even when another drew his hand. He apparently thought about him, by the motion of the eye. His tongue was weak and life still had some hold over him. His hands were without exception cold to the marrow and regret for his failing life.**The General also sent a letter of consolation to his family. It was written to his wife, Mrs. Sherman, and said: "I am deeply grieved at your loss. I have lost a son. He was my son. P. T. Sherman, my nephew, Richard, and his wife, Mrs. Richard, my Lieutenant and the Rev. Alexander and General Thomas Field. They two daughters seemed to me to be the best and fairest flowers in the garden during the last hours of their father."**No friend nor clergyman was present, except when called, to attend the services. The General's body lay in state in the New York City Hall, and the death so quiet that only the friends did not realize that the General was dead until Dr. Alexander and P. T.
