## AN EJECTMENT SUIT.

The first case argued was that of Ames H. Fielding vs Theo. McEvoy et al. Attorney J. Adams appearing for the plaintiff and George French for the defendant. A jury was waived and the case argued on the statement of facts filed. It was a suit in ejectment, plaintiff praying for a decree of possession of property situated in the rear of the west half of lot 8, Block "A," Salt Lake City, survey, on the ground that on or about June 11, 1885, the defendants without any right or authority entered upon such premises and obtained possession and have since held possession.

It was also asked that any supposed key which certain of the defendants might have upon the property be given up and that the same be turned over to the plaintiff.
