REESE AND BASS SENTENCED. William Reese and Harvey Bass, the two men who were found guilty by a

jury about a month ago of murder in the second degree, will serve out the best portion of their lives in the state prison, having been sentenced yester-day afternoon by Judge Rolapp, Reese to serve 40 years and Bass 30 years for their terrible crime.

The men were brought to Ogden Monevening from the state prison, and sat all vesterday morning in the court. room awaiting sentence, but other mat. ters occupied the attention of the court ters occupied the attention of the court until late in the afternoon, when their case was called. Attorney V. C. Gun-nell, who so energetically defended the prisoners at their hearing, was present and made a long and earnest plea for a new trial, which was denied by the court. The prisoners were than asked to stand up for sentence. They to say why sentence should not be unposed upon him replied: "I realize the duty of the court to pass sentence upon those charged with a crime, but we are innocent of the crime of which we have been found guilty.' The court replied: "If you are innocent of the crime, you are very unfortunate young men, but it is my duty to impose sentence on you, your having been found guilty of the crime by a jury. The sentence of the court is that you, William Peese, be imprisoned in the state prison for a term of 40 years, and that you. Harvey Bass, be imprisoned in the state prison for a term of 30 years." The men were very much affected by the heavy sen-tence which means about the same as life imprisonment to them, Reese being now 32 years of age and Bass 24. Reese wept and sobbed like a child on receiv-ing sentence and cried bitterly for a long time after he was returned to bla long time after he was returned to his cell in the county jail.
