The third form is a "SEALING RECORD," with spaces for name of person sealed, birth, death, time, place, etc.

The fourth form is a "BAPTISM FOR THE DEAD RECORD," with spaces for names, dates, birth, death, baptism, confirmation, etc.

Each book is furnished with a title page, on which the person owning the record can enter his or her name. An explanation of the forms, or instructions how to keep the record is also printed in each book, and its pages are numbered.

These Records are well printed and ruled on good ledger paper, substantially bound in full sheep, English roan, or Book. POSTAL AFFAIRS.

Rate of Domestic Postage.

Letters.—The standard single rate weight is 3/4 oz. avoirdupois. Single rate letter through the United States, 3 cents. For each additional 3/4 oz. or fraction thereof, 1 cent. Drop letters, single rate, 1 cent.

Newspapers and Periodicals.—The postage on newspapers and periodicals sent from the publisher's office to subscribers in the country where the paper is published, is not charged. Newspapers sent from the publisher's office to subscribers in foreign countries, 1 cent per pound. The maximum weight of any package of printed or miscellaneous matter is 1 lb. avoirdupois.

Registered Letters and Money Orders.—Letters may be registered on payment of a fee of ten cents, in addition to the regular postage. The sender must take no responsibility for loss or damage or compensation in case of loss.

Money Orders.—All principal post offices receive small sums of money and issue drafts for the same, subject to the following charges: For each dollar, 1 cent. CORRESPONDENCE.

SUNSET, August 4, 1877.

Editors Deseret News:

When I arrived at Elder Lot Smith's camp a little over one year ago I found his people living in their wagons under a heavy load of drift wood from the river. We have a blacksmith's shop, corral, stock yard, and many other good and substantial improvements. Our land was all covered with a thick growth of rabbit and grease brush, and large dry cottonwood logs, that had fallen to the ground, intervened with large quantities of drift wood from the river. We have cleared many acres of land and sown and planted wheat, corn, squash, melons, sugar cane, and a large variety of garden vegetables, all of which have done well, considering the chance they have had. We think we shall have about 600 bushels of wheat, and about the same amount of corn. We have some of the largest squash I ever saw. Our melons are excellent, our cane is getting ripe and we shall soon have a crop of molasses. Our wheat is all in the stack, we are cutting and hauling our corn into the yard.

Brother Ballinger's fort is a little more than one mile west of ours. They have had good crops of wheat, corn and several varieties of vegetables. Brothers Jackson and Binkey have been to the timber country, and made a molasses mill. Brothers Jackson, and Gagne have put the mill together, and it is now running night and day, grinding cane for Bro. Ballinger and making a first-rate article of molasses, just as good as honey.

Our grist mill has arrived, and we are going to commence building a foundation at Brother Ballinger's place, close to the river, on which to erect a house for the machinery. So far all well we shall soon have a flour mill in active operation.

Brother Hartley, an experienced lime burner, with others to assist him, has been to Sunset Pass and burned a kiln of lime, for mortar for the mill foundation. So you see that we are progressing slowly but surely. By the help of the Lord we are going to make a success of this mission. We want now to be properly organized into the United Order, and then we are bound to prosper. We are trying to work in order. We should have one organization for all the camps or settlements.

A military officer was at our camp yesterday; he was much surprised to see the great amount of work we have done in so short a time. We need more good Latter-day Saints to join us, we need a good shoemaker, Brother Ballinger needs a good blacksmith. Any and all other good faithful Saints that are willing to live in the United Order; those who do not want to live in that order had better not come out here.

God bless and prosper you and all Israel is the prayer of your brother in the New and Everlasting Covenant.
