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City Council--Proceedings at the

City Council on Tuesday evening, Mayor Little presiding.

F. A. PACE petitioned the council for permission to amend his petition of May 27th, and set forth that if the land asked for was considered to be in close proximity to the Warm Springs, he would curtail the amount of land for his dumping ground to ten or fifteen acres. As this land was being valuable to him, he hoped his prayer would be granted. Received and referred to the committee on public grounds.

Christopher Merkle petitioned for the use of one half of the street adjoining his land in the Fogelsay and Needham entry, Nineteenth Ward. Received and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

The Assessor and Collector presented a communication stating that he had been unable to complete the copying and footings of the assessment roll, and asked for one week's further extension of time to make the return. Granted. The committee on waterworks reported on the petition of John Napper, of the 30th Ward, who asked the privilege of pumping water from the water ditch through pipes to his residence, and recommended that the prayer be granted during the pleasure of the Council. Report accepted and recommendation adopted.

The committee on public grounds reported on the petition of F. A. PACE, R. B. MARGETTA, John W. SNELL and Morris & Evans, and recommended that the land asked for by them be sold and conveyed to said parties at prices from \$5 to 10 per acre, according to the location of the land, and accepted and recommendation adopted.

The Mayor presented a report of the contingent fund placed in his hands, for the quarter ending May 31st, 1879, which showed a total expenditure of \$291.91. Approved. The auditor of public accounts submitted his report for the same quarter. It showed that \$54,180.88 had been received on all accounts for the three months, and \$54,729.98 expended. The balance in treasury at last report was \$20.41. Balance in treasury June 1st, 1879, \$138.99. Referred to the committee on finance.

The street supervisor made his quarterly report, which showed the amount expended during the quarter on street improvement, \$5,121.16, besides 788 days of police labor at \$1 per day, \$788. Total \$5,909.16. Referred to the committee on claims.

The superintendent of the water works also submitted his quarterly report, which showed a total expenditure of \$2,006.48. The amount expended on service pipe to water works for the quarter was \$75.75. Referred to the committee on water works.

A motion was made and carried, to refer to the special committee on water supply the feasibility of constructing one or more reservoirs in City Creek Channel, with the probability thereof, the committee to report at an early day.

Adjourned to Tuesday, May 27th, 1879, at 7 o'clock p. m.

Base Ball.—At last the coming of the San Francisco "Athletics" is positively announced for June 25th and 30th, and July 2nd, 4th and 5th, and the guarantees have been exchanged, the association here giving them 60 per cent. of the receipts and guaranteeing for the five games \$300. This is a very large sum to offer, but it is thought that the coming of such a well known prominent professional team will warrant the proposal.

The Athletics have for four years held the California Championship in their hands, and of nine championship games played this year they have only lost one. The team is the leading one west of Omaha beyond any possible conjecture, and claims of what it can do are unnecessary, its record being almost as well known here as that of the Deserets.

Saturday the admission to the Plain City "Star" game will be but twenty-five cents to all guests, including the members' stand, and ladies will be admitted to the game free. The fair sex will doubtless turn out in force.

Terrific Storm.

DUBUQUE, Iowa, 11.—A gale of unusual severity, accompanied with thunder and lightning, swept over the city last evening, doing incalculable damage to property, unroofing buildings, demolishing fences and stripping the streets with limbs and trunks of trees. The buildings damaged are the Third Ward School, Coulter Avenue School, round houses and the electric car house. A large lot of logs, owned by Ingram, Kennedy & Day, broke up and went down the stream, a loss of \$10,000. Seventy-five dead snails were found this morning in the park. The train from Dubuque to Salt Lake was delayed on time. The storm threatened the city about seven o'clock at night, continuing two hours. The inches of water fell on a level. The velocity of the wind was 75 miles per hour, government measurement. Only one life lost, that of a small boy. The wind have been down ever since, and just restored.

Emperor William's Golden Wedding.

Berlin, 11.—The city was in holiday attire yesterday, in honor of the Emperor's golden wedding.

which will be observed to-day. Speciality boxes flank the doors of the embassies, palaces and hotels, and the arrival of the distinguished guests and of the honors accorded them, while the uniforms of the foreign colors mingle with the dark Prussian blue. Carriages dash to and fro, while the crowds delight to watch the unusual stream of brilliant equipages on the Linden.

The populace on laid a regular siege to the Emperor's palace and wherever a volley of hurrahs. The chief buildings Marklenburg Square and the opera house, and the particular streets flatter with streamers and flags. The illumination devices have been affixed here and there, and burst out this evening into flaming monograms, eagles, portraits and other compliments to the imperial pair.

In all parts of the empire addresses are voted by the provincial assemblies, municipalities and universities, and the day is taking the character of a universal festival. Newspapers of every shade unite in expressing individual love and allegiance to the revered monarch.

Among the distinguished arrivals up to yesterday morning were the royal family of Saxony, Grand Duke Alexis and Michael, Prince of the Netherlands, the Prince and Princess of Hohenzollern and the Duke of Edinburgh.
