Contract Let to Peter S. Wilson for Building Jefferson Avenue Sidewalk.

Three Divorce Spits-Held for Housebreaking-Intermountain Sheep Company-Weddings.

In the municipal court yesterday afternoon Judge Howell heard the case of the State of Utah against Fred Rogers, Ned Hastings, A. L. Johnson, Frank Johnson and George Williams, charged with housebreaking. A number of witnesses were examined for the prosecution, who testified that the commissary car of John McCardie was broken open last Friday and considerable tobacco and other articles taken. The evidence went to show that Williams was not implicated in the affair, and on motion of County Attorney Hulaniski he was discharged, but the other defendants were held to answer to the charge to the district court under \$250 bonds, which they were unable to furnish and are in the custody of the sheriff.
