Yee Wee was sentenced for the mur-der of Wee Wah in Hailey in May, 1899. An interesting feature of the case is that Wee gave the sheriff a notice to post in the Chinese quarter. It was in the nature of a statement of the in the nature of a statement of the case. A translation was introduced at the trial, which represented Wee as admitting the deed. His attorney has since had a translation made by the Chinese legation at Washington, which is radically different on that point. The incorrect translation was largely re-sponsible for Wee's conviction and the correct one has saved him from the gallows. gallows.
