The proposed site could be converted into a reservoir, the en-gineer reports, but it would be a hard atter to secure available water to fill

The engineer found four other servoir sites in the neighborhood of Huntington which could be utilized and the waters from all could be turned nto Buckhorn flat, but even then the ngineer is doubtful about there being sufficient water to irrigate the 10,000

acres sought to be redeemed. In regard to the Miller's flat reservoir proposition, the engineer reports as fol-

'It is possible to convert this flat or It is possible to convert this has a basin into a reservoir having a capa-city of about 10,000 acre-feet, through the construction of a dam about 100 feet high and 1,000 feet long on top. It is, however, doubtful if the water supply is sufficient to fill a reservoir of the accession. of this capacity. At the time of the examination, (October, 1904) the quan-tity of water flowing from Miller's flat was three second-feel, or about six acre feet, a day, Slater creek and Rolfhospital with more trouble with his necrosed foot, which is receiving sur-gical treatment. and it is possible to divert these streams from their natural channels

and cause them to flow into Miller's flat basin. The combined flow of these two streams is about equal to that of Jordan creek where it leaves Miller's flat. It is impossible from the low

cannot be profitably carried to the lands of Buckhorn flat, so much of it as is practicable to store can be profitably used to great advantage on the lands in the vicinity of Huntington and Cleveland, and I recommend that such surveys and measurements as are necessary to determine the extent and place of its profitable use be author-

## Civil Service Examinations Here for Positions in Philippines.

TEACHERS WANTED.

There will be a civil service examination in this city, Dec. 28 next, for the position of teacher in the Philippine service. The salary of this position ranges from \$1,000 to \$1,200 per annum, and will be based upon the experience and the relative standing in the examination, Those appointed will be eligible for promotion to the higher grades in the service, ranging from \$1,000 to \$2,000 for teachers, and from \$1,500 to \$2,500 for division superinten. dents. Both men and women will be admitted to this examination. It is especially desired to secure as a result of this examination 140 eligibles who are college graduates, 20 of whom shall be graduates of polytechnic schools and 20 of agricultural schools. The salaries to be paid to such graduates upon appointment will be \$1,200 per annum. It is also desired to secure 60 eligibles who are graduates of normal schools. Their salaries will be \$1,000 per annum

upon appointment. It is probable that appointments will be made as a result of this examination during the months of March and April, 1905, and that transportation will be so arranged that ap-pointees will reach Manila about June 1

As peace has been established in the Philippines and the conditions of living are improving every month, this examination affords an excellent oppor-tunity to enter an attractive service In which there is good prospect for promotion. The commission desires, how-ever, that persons who apply for this examination should be devoted to their profession, and conscientious, energetic and successful workers.
