RELIGIOUS services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will be held in the Tabernacle to-morrow afternoon, commencing at 2 o'clock. Services in German will be conducted in the City Hall at 11 a. m. and in Scandinavian in the Social Hall at 10 a. m. to-morrow.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY DICKSON'S salary is \$4,000 per year. His assistants are paid by him. The government allows him one assistant, whose salary is \$1,800. The firm of Dickson & Varian, therefore, receives \$5,800 per year from the United States for prosecuting. These facts were stated by witness Varian yesterday in the libel case.

LOCAL NEWS.

Hymeneal.—On Wednesday, Dec. 10th, Mr. Frank Kelley and Miss A. E. Hyde, both of the Seventh Ward, in this city, were united in wedlock, and on Thursday evening the friends of the bride and bridegroom assembled to commemorate the auspicious event. On the same date Mr. David O. Mackey and Miss Cahoon, of Taylorsville, were made husband and wife. We extend our congratulations, and wish our young friends godspeed on their journey through life.

Grand Jury Discharged.—At half-past 3 o'clock this afternoon the grand jury came into court and reported five indictments under Territorial laws. As the indictments have already been returned, the grand jury was discharged. The District Attorney refuses to prosecute, it is not unlikely the indictments relate to that subject, possibly the absurd charge of "conspiracy" against those who detected crime. The grand jury also presented a report preparatory to their being discharged by the Court.

With Us Again.—President Angus M. Cannon, one of the victims to political history who recently emerged from the penitentiary, is breathing freer air among us again, and apparently none the worse for his eight months' incarceration. Pres. Cannon could have come from his confinement earlier had he not determined to be the means by which the last resort could be invoked; and while the result was a disappointment, it is nothing to his discredit or disadvantage. We are pleased to see him again in our midst, and to know that his persecutions have not changed his faith in a glorious hereafter.

Attempted Jail Delivery.—Four of the defendants now confined in the county jail—Frank Mitchell, John Walters, Thomas Scanlan and John Hudson—have been preparing for several days what they thought would be a successful delivery, but were nearly foiled. It seems that the suspicions of the aged watchman were aroused by hearing suspicious sounds, as of tapping with a hammer, and his suspicions culminated yesterday afternoon in the discovery of a large hole in the wall of the cell separate that of the worthless referred to from the new vault of the Court House. They took the wrong side of their cell to work on and came to grief as above stated. Instead of their aperture leading to daylight, it brought them into deeper darkness. Correspondents should remember that this is a rule to which they must invariably conform in order to insure the insertion of their contributions.

A Sample Juror.—We have on several occasions exposed the vile conduct of some of the members of grand juries who have been most virtuous in the crusade against the "Mormons," as a sample of that material best suited to such a purpose. This is not saying that there are no men of honor called to act as grand jurors, but that our experience has shown that when the lives of rabid anti-"Mormons" have been brought to light, the horrible facts revealed dwarf into insignificance even those crimes falsely charged against the "Mormon" people. And the present method of securing jurors, in our view, rapidly lessening the liability of obtaining upright men to make investigations of violations of the laws.

Among the names of the grand jury for the September term of the Third District Court appears that of George Harrison, of this city. The sound of the name suggests a small scrap of history of a few years ago. Harrison was then in the employ of a mercantile firm in this city, Knibb & Lawrence, in the capacity of night watchman, we believe. In the southeastern part of town there resided a married woman, whose husband, at the time referred to, was absent from home. Leaving even the lives of her neighbors chance to be out, and noticed a man in front of her residence, carrying a sack. The man, discovering that he was observed, got rid of the sack by flinging it among some current bushes inside of the fence, and hastily decamped.

These actions aroused the neighbors' suspicions, and early next morning a search revealed the sack, which contained some proceeds as well as other articles of usefulness to housekeepers. The woman of the house was questioned, but denied all ownership in or knowledge of the goods, or of the person who placed them there, and the sack and its contents were turned over to a gentleman residing near by, to await further developments.

Nothing happened, however, for some days, to clear up the mystery, and on one occasion was passing out of remembrance, when the gentleman in whose care the goods were left received, by messenger, a note which considerably puzzled him.

The missive was to "Dear George," and was "warning to George" that he said the writer was being watched, and he had better keep away for a while. Investigation elicited the fact that the note came from the woman in front of whose house the sack was found, who was known to the gentleman, to her great consternation, and made a clean breast of the whole affair. She had written two notes, one to the gentleman, the other to "Dear George," or George Harrison, the "purged" grand juror and anti-"Mormon," who did not believe in "unlawful collaboration."

To cut a long story short, this Harrison, after staying at his post of duty until late in the evening, would go to the house of the woman mentioned and spend the remainder of the night with her, returning to the store early enough to elude detection. On his visits to the house he would take with him various articles from the store, of which the goods in the sack were samples. His conduct becoming known to his employers, he was discharged for his dishonesty, the goods being stolen; and now this precious disciple of "morality" is allowed to do as he pleases, "Mormon" viper, looms up in a position for which people of his class seem to be specially adapted—as an investigator of offenses under the Edmunds law! Of such are the morality-screchers.

Released on Bail.—To-day Miss Eliza Shafer, who some three months since refused to answer certain questions regarding an allegation that she was the plural wife of John W. Snell, was released on \$500 bonds, to appear before the next grand jury, Messrs McCoy and J. Snell being sureties. For three months and three days Miss Shafer has been kept in almost solitary confinement at the Penitentiary, because she would not inform the grand jury whether or not she had entered into the marriage relationship and lived with Mr. Snell as his wife. The grand jury must surely feel highly elated at what they have accomplished in this.

The lady has the kind wishes and is honored by the people for the heroic part she is taking in the struggle between truth and error, and her imprisonment for the Gospel's sake has not daunted her in the least. So far as her treatment at the hands of the prison officials is concerned, it has been kind, courteous and respectful. She was spared the experience of going before the grand jury to-day.

Father John Anderson Dead.—By notice published elsewhere, it will be seen that Father John Anderson, who is well and favorably known in the community, especially by those who hail from Scotland, passed away at two o'clock this morning, after having attained to the ripe old age of nearly eighty-one years. He is an old member of the Church, having embraced the Gospel in his native land on the 10th of December, 1849, when Apostle Orson Pratt was on his first mission to Scotland. He was very active and earnest in preaching in his native land and was full of zeal and integrity to the last; he was recently heard to say that he did not owe his relatives or country one testimony to the truth of the Gospel, and declared "that man might as well try to stop the sun from shining as to stop the growth and spread of 'Mormonism'." The funeral service will be held in the 13th Ward Assembly Rooms on Monday, commencing at 11 a. m. Friends are respectfully invited.

That Ogden Libel Case.—It will be remembered that C. W. Hamenway, editor of the Ogden Herald, was indicted some months ago on a charge of libeling certain Federal officials, the statement upon which the charge was founded being to the effect that they had been guilty of selling fees. His trial occurred yesterday, and Messrs. McKay, Varian and Ireland testified that no such combination as alleged had existed and that no such pooling had occurred. The jury returned a verdict last evening of "guilty as charged," and the 4th of January next is set as the date for sentence to be passed upon him. Still another indictment on a similar charge stands against him, which was found more recently, Judge Kane being the party who is alleged to have been libeled (who, by the way, disclaims any knowledge of the libel and denies having instituted the suit). Mr. Hamenway's demurrer to this latest indictment was this morning overruled by Judge Powers, and his trial is set for Monday next.

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Sister Reynolds' Funeral.—The funeral service over the remains of Sister Mary A. Reynolds will be held in the Twenty-first Ward meeting house to-morrow, Sunday morning, at 11 o'clock. An invitation to be present is extended to all friends of the family.

District Court.—E. Sells et al. vs. Geo. F. Atkins, et al.; decree for plaintiffs; 30 days allowed for statement on appeal.

Fatal Accident.—The following sad news was received in a special dispatch to the News, from Monroe, to-day: "Yesterday, about 12 o'clock, an accident occurred in Bullion Canyon, near Marysville, Platte County, which resulted in the death of Arthur J. Jones, aged 20, a resident of Monroe, Sevier County, Mo. In company with a boy had been out after wood and, coming down the road a stick slipped from the wagon and struck the boy on the forehead, causing him to run away. Jones also slipped off the load upon the wagon, and from there fell under the wheels, both of which passed over his body. The boy, who was held, found him about 200 yards from where he first fell. He told the boy that his back was broken. The boy then went on to camp, a short distance below, for assistance. Jones died immediately afterward, on the arrival of Mr. C. J. Henry. It is supposed that death ensued in about 10 minutes from the time the accident occurred."

Getting Justice.—The morning organ of the male strumpets makes the assertion that Mr. Foote appealed his case to the District Court, "where a non-'Mormon' can get justice." How much injustice have non-"Mormons" had practiced upon them in the justice's court, where the case referred to was tried, and how much justice have "Mormons" received in the courts of their enemies? Can anyone find a case in the former, in which judgment was given upon any other foundation than a charge of violating the law and all the facts going to show that it was violated? If so, could we not have justice's courts have but limited jurisdiction; they cannot make and unmake laws—can only rule in accordance with sworn testimony; and can any one show where such functions have been transcended in any one of the cases lately tried at the City Hall? "Justice," forsooth! It looks very much more like seeking to evade justice.

This year the horses belonging to a member of the grand jury were among the number, and although in the past but little more than local mention has been made of the occurrences, on the present occasion the grand jury was summoned before several "rich and mighty" Federal officials, and was pitted with questions as to whether he did not believe the shooting was by "Mormons," and was the work of spite, because he was a grand juror! In another recent instance, a member of a grand jury had his horses tethered in a similar manner, but as the shooter was a non-"Mormon," the matter was hushed up. And so it goes.
