M. HORN, a French economist, has just published a pamphlet, entitled the Balance Sheet of the Empire, in which he shows that the public expenditure during the first fifteen years of the Empire-including, of course, in these fifteen years the period between the coup d'état, 2d of December, 1851, and the efficial promulgation of the new régime -has been enormous beyond precedent. He divides the whole time into periods of five years. During the first, that is from 1852 to 1856, the public expendi-ture amounted to 9,648,778,793f., or a yearly average of 1,928,755,759f. The second, from 1857 to 1864, it was 10,213,-760,472f.-yearly average, 2,042,752,094f. And the third-from 1862 to 1866, 11,-134,809,486f.-average per year, 2,226,-961,987f.; making the total amount spent in fifteen years about 31,000,000,000f., or an average of 2,066,000,000f. a year.
