A GREAT WORK BY A GREAT HISTOBIAN.

Wis have received volume xxil of Hubert H. Bancroft's History of the Paclific States. It is devoted to the annals of the Northwest Coast from 1543 to 1880. The great work to which the brated historian has devoted himself, has not been issued, as those who have watched its course are aware, in consecutive volumes numerically. It has been deemed advisable by the publishers to issue volumes vi to xxxix not in their numerical order, bbt in a more chronological course, the order in which the subject naturally presents itself, which territorfal peculiarities seem to demand, and the order in which the volumes would be numbered, were the Pacific States all one nation. So presented, the whole works constitute a more continuous and unbroken story.

We have given extended notices of the previous volumes that have come to hand, and expressed our opinion of the gifted author's style, his patient research, his fidelity to well supported facts, his capacity for condensation without forfeiting any essential detail, his graceful acknowledgmentof author-ites consulted, and his masterly manner of presenting the salient features of his diverse subjects, and need not here repeat our views. The present volume is replete with interest, is emlished with numerous maps and may be properly regarded as prelimin-ary to, if not a part of, the history of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia.

A synopsis of this splendid volume of over seven hundred pages, exclu-sive of preface, table of contents and list of authorities quoted, would take up more space than we could command at present, and in any event we could not hope to make it complete. The book should be read in full by all who wish to understand the history of the Pacific Slope.

An open investigation was had and every member of the party declar-ed him guility of this and other thefts. A clamor for his life was raised but was repressed by me. I put him under surveillance until our waning strength rendered his physical services indis-pensable. Later he was found one day intoxicated, having stolen the liquor on hand for general issue. A second time his life was demanded, but I again spared him. On June 5th a theft of provisions on his part having been re-ported to me, I had a conversation with him in which I appealed to his practical sense, pointing out that it was necessary to our preservation. He promised entire reformation, but distrasting him, I issued a written order that he should be shot if detected stealing

should be shot if detected stealing again. On Jane 6th he not only stole part of the shrimps for our breakfast, ng, unaut ed, our winter camp, stole certain seal skins reserved for food. I then ordered him shot. On his person was found a silver chrono-graph abandoned by me at Fort Conger and stolen by him, and in his beg was found a large quantity of seal skin and a pair of seal skin boots stolen a few days before from the hun-ter.
