LOCAL BRIEFS.

A trout was received in this city yesterday, peculiarly marked by nature. The skin on one side was just like that of a rattlesnake.

The Burdette family at Forest Dale is singularly afflicted. One of their children died July 23 last, a second died Aug. 12, and now a third, Mary Burdette, died yesterday of typhoid fever.

Former Sheriff H. W. Hawley of Millard county, and of late a resident of Seattle, has gone into bankruptcy, with liabilities of \$1,000. His creditors mostly live in this state.

George Preston, a messenger boy, has returned after an absence of two weeks. He says he ran away from home because his parents repeatedly told him to go out and get work, and he went up into Davis county where he found work.


Considerable excitement was caused at the Katinger last night, by a negro being shot at a revolver at the rear of the hotel. The shot was fired about 10:30 and immediately there was a rush on the part of the police and employees of the hotel. The negro did not remain to be questioned, but ran and made his escape before the officers arrived. It is said the fellow did not know how to empty the gun otherwise than shooting the bullets out.

The striking linemen claim that if the proposed amalgamation of striking interests fail to bring the telephone company to their way of thinking, Salt Lake will be put under the ban, and union men not allowed to work here without surrendering their union cards. Cost of living in Salt Lake is claimed to be relatively higher than in many other cities, and the advance in wages was asked to cover the difference. In the meantime the striking linemen are drawing support from the general brotherhood.
