LOANS AND OTHER MATTERS.

FRIENDSHIP MEETING.

The regular meeting of the Friendship of the Salt Lake Stake of Zion, held at the Fourteenth Ward Assembly Rooms on Saturday, January 19, at 11 a. m.

Y. M. M. L. A. in Box Elder Stake.
On December 20, Elder B. F. Cummings, Jr., left the city to go to Box Elder County, having been sent by the Central Committee to labor in the interest of the Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association of Box Elder Stake. After conferring with the authorities of the Stake, Elder Thomas H. Wilde, of Brigham City, was selected as Superintendent of the Association of Box Elder Stake, and on Sunday, December 30th, he was presented to the people of Brigham City who unanimously sustained him by vote.

Elder Cummings, accompanied by Elder Wilde, Lucius A. Snow and Joseph J. Brown, then proceeded to make a tour through the Stake and held one or more meetings in each organized settlement, presenting Elder Wilde to the people, who, in every instance, unanimously sustained him as Superintendent of the Y. M. M. I. Association of the Stake.

Elder Cummings and party organized associations at Honeyville, Hampton, Plymouth, Samaria and East Portage, and effected reorganizations in two or three other settlements. The party went as far north as Malad, holding, during their tour, sixteen meetings. The priesthood of the settlements invariably seconded the labors of the party, and cordially sustained them in their teachings and the business they performed.

On the return of the party to Brigham City it was thought best to effect a general re-organization there, as the association numbered over 250 members and was too large to admit of the members taking part in the exercises often than once in several weeks, hence it was impossible for them to improve as rapidly as they otherwise might. To obviate this disadvantage, it was decided, by and with the approval of the proper authorities, to divide the association into four and have one in each of the four wards of the city.

Accordingly, at a special meeting of the people, held on Sunday evening, Jan. 20th, this was done, and a set of officers for each of the four associations was presented and unanimously sustained. The four associations of Brigham City now show an average membership of over sixty, and the total membership of the Association of Box Elder Stake is about 750, a very much better showing, according to the population, than that presented by the rest of the Territory.

The meetings held by the party were always well attended, and it was most gratifying to witness the eagerness with which the young men listened to the teachings and instructions presented to them and their deep interest in the movement.

Ogden City.—We observe by the Journal that there is considerable difference of opinion among the people of Ogden regarding a movement to induce the Legislature, at its present session, to reduce its present proportions by curtailing the corporate limits. The parties petitioning for this object suggest, for several reasons they consider sound, the slicing from the municipality all that part lying north of Ogden River.

In general, we might say, laudable, policy of the people of this Territory has been to so arrange municipalities as to make them cover as much ground as practicable, corporations having certain legislative powers, while counties have virtually little or none. It has been thought that in this way the rights of the people have received better protection, and their interests subserved to a greater degree than they could otherwise.

The enemies of the great majority of the people have generally aimed to prevent the expansion of city corporations, with a view to curtailing local legislative powers. Doubtless it would be an easy matter at this time, were the legislative legislature so disposed, to diminish the size of a corporation, by the application of the legislative knife. But should circumstances, such as the growth and general material advancement of the same city, require an extension of its borders again, whether that operation could be performed with the same facility, is a matter involving some doubts.

We believe that the corporate limits of Salt Lake City extend, in some directions, several miles beyond its thickly populated part. In view of the growing importance and the magnitude of its activities, future, and other reasons, the reduction of its outer lines would scarcely be advisable.

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LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

January 20, 1913.

C. F. 2. "A bill to limit the time within which criminal actions may be commenced," was then taken up. The House amendments read, on motion of Counselor Thurston, the first two amendments were not concurred in, and a conference committee was asked for, to act with a like committee from the House, to consider said amendments.

The President appointed Counselors S. S. Smith and M. Thatcher said committee.

Counselor S. S. Smith, chairman of the committee on counties, to whom was referred the petition and resolution to appoint a commission to define the boundaries between Weber and Morgan counties, reported the same back with C. F. 15, "A bill for an act appointing a special commission," etc.

Said bill was read, and on motion of Counselor Raleigh, passed its first reading, and taken up on its second reading, amended, and on motion of Counselor W. H. Smith, passed its second reading.

A communication was received from the House, announcing the appointment of Messrs. Milner and Farr a committee of conference to act with a like committee from the Council on C. F. No. 2.

HOUSE.
C. F. No. 4 was taken up, and pending its second reading was recommended to the committee on Judiciary with instructions.

A communication was received from Mr. James Dwyer, tendering the freedom and hospitality of his book store to the members during their stay in the city.

H. F. No. 7 came up for its second reading and was laid on the table till called for.

A message was received from the Council, announcing the non-concurrence of that body in amendments Nos. 1 and 2 to C. F. No. 2, and that Counselors S. S. Smith and M. Thatcher had been appointed a committee of conference on the part of that Council, to consider said amendments.

On motion of Mr. Smith, the amendments of C. F. No. 2 were not concurred in, and a committee of conference was ordered.

The Speaker appointed Messrs. Farr and D. Milner said committee.

H. F. No. 8 was taken up on its second reading, pending which it was laid on the table till called for.

COUNCIL.
January 29.
Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Roll called, quorum present.
Prayer by the Chaplain.

Counselor S. S. Smith, chairman of the committee of conference, appointed to consider House amendments to C. F. 2, "An act to limit the time within which criminal actions may be commenced," reported and recommended that the House recede from their amendments and report in the bill as amended.

Counselor Thatcher presented C. F. 16, "A bill to enable corporations which are or may be formed under the laws of the Territory, to amend their charters, etc.," which was read, and

On motion of Counselor Thatcher, referred to the committee on general incorporations, with authority to take into consideration any amendments to the general incorporation act.

C. F. 15, "A bill to appoint a special commission to define the boundary line between Weber and Morgan counties; taken up on the third reading by its title, the title read and the bill passed.

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Benediction by the chaplain.

Mr. Gardner presented a petition from Mr. D. Park, for pay for services in pursuit of escaped convicts and for a gratuity for them killed. Read and, on motion of Mr. Hatch, referred to the committee on claims, etc.

Mr. Fisher presented a petition from J. M. Benedict et al, to amend the fish and game laws. Read and referred to the committee on agriculture, etc.

Mr. Alwood presented a petition from Wm. Lander and 216 other citizens of Summit County, requesting legislation to change the boundaries of Rich County; read and referred to the committee on counties.

Editors Denver News:
Dear Brothers—I thought a few lines from this place would not be out of order. The health of the people here is good, and the winter is very pleasant. We have not had over one and a half inches of snow yet this winter, and the male portion of the community have labored all winter so far, hauling fencing, and building, and preparing to live. We have good prospects for a crop next season as the grasshoppers did not deposit their eggs here and the rain was good. Our crops were not lost last year.

This place is now settling up very fast but there is plenty of land and water for a great many more, so come on.

We have had two deaths here this winter, a daughter of Brother Joseph Holman and Henry Forbush. Bishop A. Goodfellow called the sisters of this place together last Thursday and organized them into a relief society, with Sister Mary Goodfellow as president, and Sister Ellen Robins and Mary Ann Osterhout as counselors, sister Esther Goodfellow as secretary, and Sister Mary Potter as treasurer. Our relief society is well organized and a good feeling exists among the people.
