GREENE FORMER PRESIDENT OF ASPHALT TRUST.

Police Commissioner Francis Vinton Greene, who was president of the Asphalt trust during the Matos revolution of 1901, in Venezuela, was a witness in the suit of the Venezuela government to recover \$11,000,000 from the trust for its participation in the Matos revolution, before United States Commissioner Cilchrist, Mr. Greene made the following statement:

"My only knowledge of this matter comes from what was told me by Mesars. Mack, Andrews and Sewall. When I returned from Europe in October, 1901, 1 was surprised to learn from them that during my absence they had decided to support Matos in his contest with Castro. I told them I thought they had made a great mistake, because it was not acting in good faith with the state department in Washington, which up to that time had supported the Bermudeg company,

"I also told them I thought it a great mistake, because it would cost the company a great deal of money in addition to the amount which they told me they had already expended, which, as I recollect, was in the neighborhood of \$100,000, and that the company was not in a position to spend such large sums of money.
