# Jack Treadwell, An Artillery Recruit, Tells How He Was Approached.

Jack Treadwell, formerly a private in the Twenty-first infantry, enlisted yesterday afternoon, at the U.S. Army recruiting station for the One Hundred and Fifth battery of heavy artillery,

He has lived for 18 years in Japan where he says the feeling against the United States is so bitter that war is pretty sure to occur in the not distant future, and Englishmen and Ameri-cans are leaving the Japanese domin-ions. Treadwell also tates he was ap-proached by a Jap recently in a Rich-ards street restaurant, with an offer of \$150 per month if he would enlist in the artillery service as a spy to locate mines and furnish descriptions of for-tifications on the Pacific const. The of-rer was refused; as the Jap had been unable to secure the desired infor-mation himself, and he had been de-tailed by his government to act in this country as a spy, while he was posing as a traveling salesman for a San Francisco Japanese house. Treadwell says he has enlisted all right, but not to serve the Japanese government, but rather help train a gun on the first Jap-anese war vessel that appears off San Francisco.
