Man Whose Impressive Statement Created a Sensation.

The above is an excellent likeness of Hon. James Sharp, father-in-law of James R. Hay, victim of the tragedy. No man or woman who heard the words uttered by Mr. Sharp in his testimony on Thursday, will ever forget them, In tones so solemn that they impressed the most unsusceptible heart, he declared he knew Mortensen was the murderer of Hay. When pressed under rigid cross examination for an answer as to how he knew he said it was because God had revealed it to him.

On the Tuesday morning after the disappearance of Hay Mr. Sharp openly accused Mortensen of the crime, and in the presence of an officer told him that the body of the young man would be dug out of the fields within a mile of where they stood and before the expiration of the twenty-four hours in which he was then speaking. Mortensen turned as pale as death but made no effort at denial, whereupon the officer said to Mr. Sharp, "Almost any other man in the world would have killed you for making such a charge." Hon. Charles Crane Tells of the Most Practicable Route-From Ketchum, Idaho, Into the New Gold Camp-Description of the Proposed Road.

Walter Clark is the writer who says: "As the road from Ketchum to Thunder Mountain will go through Seafoam and Sheep mountain, it will interest you to use your influence with | Rapid river to the middle fork of the the railroad to favor this road as you know there are many valuable mining properties in and around Sheep mountain and Seaform which this road will open up. We built a bridge across Salmon last October, and will have one across Valley creek before the water

Mr. Crane says he has been over several of the routes leading into this new mining district, and in his opinion Ketchum, the terminus of the river branch of the Oregon Short Line is much the best starting point to reach the district.

"An old, and splendid wagon road, now runs within about forty or forty-five miles of the camp, and it is more than likely that by next June, the road will be completed by this route into the camp. The road leaves Ketchum pass ing up Wood river to the old town of Galena, twenty-eight miles, a lead dis trict, from which in the years past, thousands of tons of high grade ore were extracted. From Galena, which is only four and one-half miles from the summit of the Lem to the range, road drops down into the head of the Salmon, passing Galena basin, Washington basin, Vienna and Saw Tooth in which latter district Landlord Ewing, of the Cullen hotel, has a fine lead of high grade ore. This road passes the great Red fish lakes, Hot Springs district (a new gold camp discovered last year). From Galena to Mose Storer's is thirty-five miles over the best natural road in the state Mose Storer's is at the junction of Valley creek and the Salmon river. From Storer's to Cape Horn is eighteen miles over the state road, and level as a floor passing Stanley Basin a once prosper ous placer camp, and where has lately been built a dredge, to work over 50,000 acres of placer ground, some of this

"From Cape Horn the road turns due north direct to Thunder mountain. crossing Beaver creek and up over to Seafoam, the center of the coming great silver-lead camp of Idaho, and distant from Cape Horn about fifteen miles. From Seafoam the road passes down Salmon, down which it runs to Marble which is distant about forty-five miles from Seafdam. The distance from Ketchum to Scafdam is about ninetysix miles and I have traveled it a score of times in sixteen hours. From Sea foam to Thunder mountain, the road is new but Horace Lewis, who is building stations along this route, with his usual foresight and energy, will soon have it in splendid condition for travel, he is now putting in hay and grain for his freight and stage teams next summer
