DRINK DID IT.

Philip Cassidy in a Serious Condition at The Hospital.

Philip Cassidy of Portland, Ore., who was arrested last Thursday night by Officer Clive for drunkenness, is now in a very serious condition at the Holy Cross hospital suffering from acute alcoholism and his recovery is very doubtful. The man says that he was not drank when arrested, hut was sick. The speaker alluded to personal ex-perience in the Church, and testified that this latter-day movement was the work of the Lord, brought forth by a servant of God, Huxley's statement to the contrary polycitecture. servant of God, Huxley's statement to the contrary notwithstanding. He spoke of the early rise of the Church, their settlement of this valley, and the fulfillment of predictions which at the time they were uttered seemed impos-sible of fulfillment. All these, said be, were evidences of the work of God.
