### FOR PENSIONS FOR GOVERNMENT EMPLOYES

Washington, Feb. 25.—By agreeing to a favorable report on Representative Gillette's civil retirement bill the house committee on civil service report has given much impetus to the movement providing pensions for superanuated employees in this city of the ment providing pensions for superan-nated employes in this city of the classified service. It provides that on reaching the age of retirement an em-ploye shall receive an annuity equal to 1½ per cent of the entire compensation received by him during his entire ser-vice. Each employe will be required to set aside during his service a sum suffi-cient with compound interest to create the annuity at the age of retirement. The age fixed for retirement is as follows:

For rallway postal clerks, 66: letter carriers, 65: and the remaining branches of the service, 70. The bill also provides for the retention of employes whose services are considered of advantage for two or four years after resulting the age of retirement.
