Insane Suspect Released.—Martin Anderson was examined as to his mental condition by Judge W. H. King yesterday afternoon and it was decided by County Physician Calderwood and Dr. Raley to continue the detention of a patient in the hospital, and to release the man on his own recognizance. He did not deem him to be in such a condition as would warrant a commitment to the state mental hospital. Anderson is a tailor and was arrested by the police officers on Sunday evening on the charge of insanity.

City Garbage Problem.—The anti-litter committee of the city council held another meeting on the garbage matter yesterday in the office of Health Commissioner Stewart. Splendid City Water.—A test of the water used by the residents of this city has been made by City Chemist Harp and has been found to be of the highest quality. Two samples of water were taken from a tap in the basement of the city hall, and the results show that the water is of "excellent purity." The water is about as pure as any in the country, and contains only 15.25 grains of solid per gallon. Of this 14.005 grains are mineral matter. A test of water taken from City creek before it passes through the water system shows that it contains only 14.95 grains of solid matter per gallon.

Glen Miller's Experience.—Glen Miller has returned to Salt Lake from San Francisco on account of the serious illness of his representative here, Earl D. Hardy. Mr. Miller was on the last train that pulled through the flood waters at Sacramento, with the stream up to the steps of the cars, and he afterwards learned that the tracks had gone out shortly after his train had passed over. At Sparks, Nev., Mr. Miller noted haystacks, small houses, things floating about, conduits washed away, and destruction to pay generally. OVERDRAFT ILLEGAL. Additional Reason Why Banks Decide To Discontinue the Accommodation. On April 1 and after the man who overdraws on his account at the bank will find that he has been playing a reasonable joke on himself in that the check will come back with stamps upon its face and come suggesting that it could not be paid for lack of funds. RECREATION SERVICE WORK

What the U. S. Government Has Accomplished in This Direction to Jan. 1.

SPENDING \$1,000,000 A MONTH

Some Decidedly Interesting Statistics Regarding What is Being Accomplished in Deserts of West.

(Special to the "News.") Washington, D. C., March 27.—A summation of the work of the reclamation service to Jan. 1 shows that it has dug 1,267 miles of canals, or nearly the distance from Washington to Omaha. Some of these canals carry whole rivers, like the Truckee river in Nevada and the North Platte in Wyoming. The tunnels excavated are 47 in number, and have an aggregate length of 9 1/2 miles. The service has erected 24 large structures, including the great dams in Nevada and the Mindokan dam in Idaho 80 feet high and 650 feet long. It has completed 670 head works, etc. It has built 376 miles of wagon road in mountainous country and into heretofore inaccessible regions. It has erected and in operation 77 miles of telephone lines. Its own cement mill has manufactured 70,000 barrels of cement, and the purchased amount is 312,000 barrels. Its own saw mills have cut 2,085,000 feet B. M. and 6,430,000 feet S. M. lumber.
