

First South Street (both sides), from First East to Seventh East Streets.

Second South Street (both sides), from First East to Seventh East Street.

Third South Street (both sides), from East Temple to Seventh East Street.

And the following streets constitute District No. 2:

South Temple Street (both sides), from West Temple to Third West Street.

First South Street (both sides), from West Temple to Fourth West Streets.

Second South Street (both sides), from West Temple to Fifth West Street.

Third South Street (both sides) from East Temple to Third West Street, excluding block from Clift House to Metropolitan Hotel, and north side of the Old Fort block.

West Temple Street (both sides) from South Temple to Sixth South Street.

East Temple Street (west side) from Third to Seventh South Street.

East Temple Street (west side) from North Temple to First North Street.

First West Street (both sides) from South Temple to Fourth South Street.

And we further recommend that the street supervisor be instructed to report to the Council on Tuesday evening, April 8th, the following:

Total number of feet of sidewalk and of street crossings.

Estimate cost of grading sidewalk and crossings, and of sidewalk laid with the best cement eight feet wide, consisting of — inches of concrete, and — inches of cement, — of sand, — of cement.

Estimate cost of crossings to consist of red sandstone flagging six feet wide.

Estimate cost of lumber and stakes.

The report was adopted.

The committee on licenses reported on the petition of the greengrocers, recommending that all fruit and candy stands be removed from the streets, because it was unjust to dealers who pay rent and license, to allow them to do business free of both. Adopted.

The city attorney suggested that the salaries would have to be fixed by ordinance. He had drawn one and the blanks were filled in with the above figures and the ordinance passed.

Witcher Jones and associates submitted a proposition to purchase the city waterworks, franchises, irrigation works, etc., on the following terms:

"The undersigned to select an engineer, and the city an engineer, who shall estimate the value of said plant and franchises, and in case they disagree, then the two shall select a third, and whatever shall be agreed upon by the board shall be binding upon the city and ourselves, and shall be paid within ninety days thereafter. We will file with the city a bond satisfactory to the city, guaranteeing payment of money agreed upon as the purchase price aforesaid. At the end of fifty years the city to have the right of purchasing the plant and waterworks by paying the value of the same as it shall then appear upon a report of a board of arbitrators selected as aforesaid. We will agree to at once begin, and as rapidly as the work can be prosecuted we will expend sufficient money to improve canals, pipes and water supply that the supply shall exceed the demand for water in the city. We will maintain all of the waterworks and canals in good order and repair, and will furnish water to the citizens at a price not exceeding the present rates for water. This offer, if accepted, will secure to the citizens an ample supply of pure water without using the tax receipts and without increasing the personal water rents. It will result in the laying of all new pipes and mains needed without expense to the abutting property owners, and it will immediately place in the treasury of the city a large sum of money which can be expended on needful municipal improvements.

The proposition was referred to the committee on waterworks, a motion to refer it to a special committee of five being lost.

L. C. Trent petitioned to have a street opened leading to Capitol Hill. Referred to the committee on public grounds.

The Western Union asked permission to put more telegraph poles in certain streets. Referred to the committee on improvements.

Wm. Jones and others protested against the granting to P. J. Sullivan of a license for a saloon opposite the Utah & Nevada depot. Referred to the committee on license.

Pembroke offered a resolution providing that the Mayor give the street railroad sixty days' notice that they must put their tracks in

good order on certain streets or forfeit their franchise. Referred to the committee on streets.

Karrick offered a resolution relative to paving crossings, but withdrew it as the subject had been covered by the report of the committee on improvements.

Pembroke offered a resolution calling on the recorder for the cost of the waterworks, maintenance, revenue derived from same, etc., but it fell flat for lack of a second.

Several bills were presented and disposed of, and a petition to extend the water mains on Third South Street east, was referred to the committee on waterworks.

The ordinance creating the office of city engineer was read the third time and passed.

The scavenger ordinance was taken from the table, read through and tabled again.

The following amounts were appropriated: To the marshal's contingent fund \$1,000; C. R. Beckworth \$20; W. J. Dean \$8.35; G. D. Felt \$9.10; A. J. Burt \$469.50; sewer employees \$345.

A member moved that the appointment of city officers be proceeded with. Carried.

Cohn moved that the council go into executive session. Carried by a vote of 8 to 4.

Immediately after the room was cleared of spectators and reporters, some members objected to secret sessions as improper and unlawful.

The City Attorney being appealed to, held that the law required the sessions to be public, whereupon Mayor Scott decided to be out of order the motion which had just been carried, and the spectators returned.

It became apparent that the foregoing ticket had been agreed to in caucus, but notwithstanding this Karrick nominated Mr. Devine for inspector of buildings, and J. L. May for poundkeeper. The former received five votes and the latter four.

Anderson protested against such violation of caucus pledges.

The appointments being made the Council adjourned for one week.
