

THE ANTI-PUSEYITE PARTY in the English Church, have recently achieved a new triumph in procuring the revocation of the license of the Rev. Alfred Poole, one of the curates of the church of St. Barnabas, in the fashionable district of Belgravia, in London—the very church, by the way, the rector of which was lately a party to the famous case about the lawful use in English churches, of crosses, candles and stone communion tables. A great meeting was lately held in London, which adopted a memorial to the Queen and a petition to Parliament “to put down the confessional system and other practices not in accordance with the Church of England, and to protect the purity of the faith and worship of the Protestant Reformed Church from the devices and machinations of men who, while nominally belonging to that Church and paid for teaching its doctrines, are in reality enforcing the principles and carrying out the practices of the Church of Rome, to the perversion of many from the Church of Rome, to the perversion of many from the faith, to the scandal and disgrace of the Church, and to the general injury of all classes of the people.”

FRENCH VIEW OF FREE LOVERS' TENDENCIES IN THE UNITED STATES.—The French journals, the Patrie and the Univers, are occupying themselves with the subject of divorce and the free-love tendencies in the United States. The resolutions of a late meeting of the presbytery of Chicago on the subject of divorce meets their concurrence. America, according to their journals, is destined irresistibly to glide into immortality, whether she will or no. From tolerance she will pass into license, and from license into something worse. The doctrines of Mrs. Branch are such as were heard in France in the days of the Goddess of Reason—in the day when clubs and pretended schools flourished, and when licentiousness, debauchery and atheism occupied the upper current of society. The French are thankful that that day has passed in France, and they regret to see that the same doctrines find hearers and tolerance in the great Western Republic.

The Birmingham Journal has the following:—

“On Friday the proceedings were almost entirely suspended, for the purpose of watching the progress of a chess-playing feat never before witnessed in England. We refer to Mr. Morphy's playing eight games blindfold. His opponents were Lord Lytton, President of the Association; Mr. Salmon the best player Ireland affords; Mr. Kipping a very strong player; Mr. Avery; Mr. Carr; Dr. Freeman; Mr. Rhodes, and Mr. U. R. Mills. The play commenced at one o'clock, and terminated about a quarter past six, and resulted in Mr. Morphy winning every game except the one with Mr. Kipping (Secretary of the Manchester Club). The match between Messrs. Staunton and Morphy stands thus: stake £500 a side, the scoror of the first 11 wins, to commence 1st November next.

An Act

Prescribing certain qualifications necessary to enable a person to be eligible to hold office, vote or serve as a juror.

SEC. 1.—Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah, that no person shall be elected a delegate to the Congress of the United States from this Territory who has not been a resident therein during one year next preceding the day of election.

SEC. 2.—No person shall be eligible to a seat in either branch of the Legislative Assembly unless he has been a resident in the county or district to be represented, during at least one year next preceding the day of election.

SEC. 3.—No person shall be elected or appointed to any territorial, district, county or precinct office unless he shall have been a constant resident therein during at least one year next preceding such election or appointment; neither shall any person be entitled to hold any office of trust or profit in the Territory or vote at any election unless he is a free, white male citizen of the United States, over twenty years of age and has been a constant resident in the Territory during the six months next preceding said election or appointment.

SEC. 4.—A person is not eligible to serve and therefore shall not serve on any grand or petit jury in any court in this Territory unless he is a free, white male citizen of the United States, is over twenty years of age, is of reputed sound mind and discretion, is not so disabled in body as to be unable to serve, has not been convicted of any capital or infamous crime, owns taxable property and pays taxes in this Territory and has been a constant resident therein during the year last preceding his being selected to serve as a juror.

SEC. 5.—And be it further enacted, that no officer or soldier of the United States army or other person subject to their military authority is eligible to hold any office or serve on any jury or vote at any election in this Territory unless his home at place of residence was therein at the time of engaging in such service.

SEC. 6.—No person shall be deemed a resident within the meaning of this act, unless he is a tax payer in this Territory.

SEC. 7.—All laws and parts of laws conflicting with this act are hereby repealed.
