XXIX CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 22.—Logan submitted
the following resolution, and asked
that it might be printed and lie over,
saying he would call it up on some fu-
ture day and submit some remarks on it.

Resolved, That the sessions of the
Senate, commonly known as Execu-
tive sessions, so far as they apply to
nominations, confirmations or rejec-
tions, shall hereafter be held with open
doors, and that a public record of the
same shall be kept the same as of leg-
islative sessions.

The resolution was ordered printed and
to lie over.

The Chair laid before the Senate Log-
an's bill to increase the efficiency of
the army.

Logan, at the suggestion of the Sec-
retary of War, moved for some further
amendments of detail to the bill and
they were agreed to.

The Chair laid before the Senate the
judiciary committee resolution.

Colquhoun took the floor in opposition
to the majority report. The only subject
Colquhoun could see that was to be sub-
servient by the adoption of the resolu-
tion reported by the majority.

Colquhoun reported that the majority
committee was to place on record and
perpetuate the majority.

Jackson followed Colquhoun, also in
opposition to the majority report.

Before adjournment, the Senate
went into executive session and soon
adjourned.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 22.—The bill granting
a pension of \$3,000 a year to the widow
of Gen. W. Hancock was passed;
yeas 107, nays 40.

Healer, from the committee on pub-
lic lands, reported that he had secured
certain lands granted to aid in the con-
struction of the Northern Pacific Rail-
road. Adjourned.

FOREIGN.

Homes Rule for Ireland.

LONDON, 22.—Mr. Gladstone occu-
pied his usual seat in the House of
Commons this afternoon. He appeared
to be in excellent health and spirits.

Mr. William Vernon Harcourt, Chan-
cellor of the Exchequer, replied to
Mr. Goschen, said the government was
not disposed to appoint a special com-
mission to examine into and report on
the silver question, because the spec-
ulation of various land properties in
Ireland, which at these valuations are
to be handed over to the possession of
the government in exchange for Con-
sols.

In this way Ireland is to be made
a debtors' country, and the land is to
be sold to the landlords, together with
interest, the whole sum to be re-
paid to the government in the form of
land in installments within fifty years,
at the end of which time the lessees
are to become freeholders. The plan
involves a domestic arrangement be-
tween the government of Ireland and
the landlords, and is a matter of great
importance to the people of Ireland.

It is necessary to know that there never has
been a more successful scheme for
buying out real estate owners in Ire-
land.

It is now declared that the Premier
in his scheme, proposes the appoint-
ment of a commission of experts to fix
the value of the land properties in Ire-
land, which at these valuations are

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

There were 70 arrests Sunday in New
York for excise violation—double the
usual number.

In Valparaiso, a clerk belonging to a
well-known house of ill fame has been
arrested with \$30,000.

The Emperor William's complete
restoration to health is ascribed to the
warm weather now prevailing.

The newspapers of the day have been
convinced to pay him most fervent
tributes.

Railroad traffic in St. Louis is almost
at a standstill on account of the strike
of over 300 switchmen. Their grievance
is that they are not paid as much as
the men in other cities.

A Pittsburgh dispatch says: The fire at
the Murrayville gas well was set on
purpose by a man named John J. White,
an Italian known as "No. 5," who was
killed outright, and several others were
seriously injured.

Alderman Jachne spent the night in a
cell at police headquarters, and this
morning was taken down to the Dis-
trict Court to answer to a later in-
dictment on a charge of conspiracy.

The prisoner was given until
Wednesday to enter his plea. The
amount of bail was fixed at \$25,000.

The bark *James Stedford*, arrived in
New York to-day, and reports that on
January 20th, at a point in the Gulf of
Mexico, latitude 43 degrees 15 min-
utes, and longitude 84 degrees 15 min-
utes, a hurricane of great violence
prevailed, blowing from the north-
west for 12 hours, during which time
Chas. Morry, James H. Cullen and
Hector McLean were washed overboard
and lost. The ship was wrecked and
sunk, and all hands were lost.

THE BOOK OF JUDGES.

CHAP. I.—SPEECH OF THE CHIEF
JUDGE TO THE CRUIZERS.

Ye call me Judge! And ye do well
to call me Judge! who has stood, for
these many months, in this wicked
city, and seen the vilest of crimes
committed, and the most heinous of
murders perpetrated, and the most
outrageous of wrongs done, and the
most unchristianlike of wars waged,
