

Irrigation Department are kept, that the heads of the departments make up their pay rolls from a daily timebook in the hands of the foreman of each gang. The book contains the names of all employees and the time they put in, and is verified by the heads of departments. The heads of departments also identify each employee, and the treasurer is held responsible for the payment to the employees to whom the money is due as shown by the pay roll.

The committee also recommended a strict enforcement of the resolution requiring heads of departments to submit to the council requisitions in advance of purchases for supplies needed, and that no heads of departments be exempt from furnishing the council quarterly in advance an estimate of the cost of their departments. Adopted.

#### THE ORDINANCE VETOED

The Mayor's veto of the city ordinances, which appeared in full in this paper on Saturday last, was then read by the recorder.

Moran—I do not agree with the Mayor. I think we should pass the ordinances over his honor's veto.

Bell—In case we do that, can we not amend the ordinances afterward if we should ascertain that the Mayor is correct in some of his suggestions?

The chair—Certainly; the Council can make any law it chooses.

The ordinances then passed over the Mayor's veto on the following vote:

Ayes—Beardsley, Bell, Evans, Heise, Horn, Kelly, Lawson, Loofbouro, Moran, Rich, Simondi, Wantland—12.  
Noes—Fulland, Hardy, Karrick—3.

#### MARKET HOUSE.

Wantland moved that the recorder be instructed to advertise for propositions from property owners looking towards the establishment of a public market house. Adopted.

#### TO OPEN BIDS.

The recorder announced that he had received bids for printing the city laws; that they were now lying unopened in his safe; that it was very desirable that a committee be appointed to open them so that the work of printing could be proceeded with. He said further that there were only three firms in the city that were able to do the work, viz: the Deseret News Publishing company, Tribune Publishing company and Kelly & Co. The "small fry," he said, were not in it.

The matter was referred to the committee on enrollment, consisting of Evans, Simondi and Rich.

#### THE PROCEEDINGS.

John B. Timony and others asked that electric lights be placed at the intersection of Eighth South and Eighth East and at the intersection of Eighth South and Ninth East streets. Committee on improvements.

A. G. Paddock asked a renewal of his lease for the city sand beds. Committee on public grounds.

#### INTERSECTIONS INCLUDED.

The board of public works sent in the following: In pursuance of a resolution passed by the Council we represent that the work of paving the intersection of Main, First, Second and Third South streets is included in the contract with the Culmer-Jennings company of the 6th of October, 1892, and in our opinion cannot be excepted from their contract. #### TAX CANCELLED.

The same body reported that the curbing now set in front of the property belonging to Alfred Best had been set by private contract and was acceptable and recommended that the tax be cancelled.

#### ADDITIONAL CANCELLATION.

The same body recommended that the sidewalks new constructed in front of the premises belonging to Elizabeth Grace McIntosh, Catherine M. Snellgrove, Laura M. Snellgrove, Elizabeth Drue and the Fifteenth Ward Ecclesiastical Co-op, be accepted in lieu of the tax assessed. Referred back to the board of public works.
