## FELL FOURTEEN FEET.

Fred. H. Bell Meets with a Serious Accident.

Yesterday afternoon Fred. H. Bell, who is employed by the Tenth Ward Lumber and Building association as foreman on the Karrick building, at the corner of State and Second South streets, fell a distance of fourteen feet and was severely hurt. He was engaged with some of the workmen in placing some heavy loads on the second floor, when he lost his balance, and falling he was flung, jumped to reach for something, however, to hold himself, and he fell backwards a distance of fourteen feet, striking on his shoulders and head. He was picked up unconscious and remained to that condition until about seven o'clock this evening, when he awoke a little and called for his wife, The Drs. White who were called to attend him made an examination, and stated that no bones were broken, but that the intense pain had been caused by concussion.
