

GOV. MC CONNELL RISES TO EXPLAIN

His Reference, in Smoot Case, to
Members of Idaho Legislature
Not Intended as Reflection.

AS A RULE ARE GOOD MEN.

Some Not Being Affiliated With Any
Church Are Not Under Any Great
Restraint.

(Special to the "News.")

Washington, D. C., Jan. 14.—Gov. McConnell's attention was called today to the resolution of the legislature at Boise, in which he was condemned for alleged reflections upon the characters of members of that body. The governor said: "In my testimony I made this statement: 'There are "Mormons" in the Idaho Legislature today and observation will reveal to anyone who has the time or interest to look it up, that they will pay attention to their business more closely and will be farther away from immorality than the entire mass of Gentiles. While a majority of all members will be good men, yet there will be men elected from certain counties who have not the moral restraint thrown around them that we would expect.'"

"The average legislator of Idaho will compare favorably with the members of Congress. It is true they are not all total abstainers in either body, nor are they all church members. The idea I intended to convey was that "Mormon" legislators being all members of their church are naturally under greater restraint and more careful in their conduct than members of a legislature who have no church affiliations. Speaking for the members of my own county, as well as all others with whom I am acquainted in the present legislature, they are as fine a body of men morally as may be found in any legislative body."

Some Cold in Kansas.

GEN. STOESSEL

Arrives at Nagasaki on the Transport Kamakuru.

Nagasaki, Jan. 14.—The Japanese transport Kamakuru, from Port Dalry Jan. 11, with Gen. Stoessel and others on board arrived here today. After a prolonged quarantine inspection Gov. Arakawa, with the chief officials of this port, proceeded on board the Kamakuru at 3 in the afternoon and Gen. and Mrs. Stoessel, two of the Russian command staff, personal staff, seven other officers, two ladies and six orphan children were landed in three steam launches at the Inasa Jetty, where they were received by a guard of police and several other officers and general arms. The general looked well and walked with a steady step. Preceded by a few police officers and followed by his retinue, Gen. Stoessel slowly wended his way up the hill to a prettily situated bungalow on Inasa hill where he will be quartered. Half way there some dozens of Russian officers were finding that their late chief was arriving, ran up from all directions and saluted in respectful silence. The party then entered the house. The closing act of the drama caused a feeling of sadness which was not dispelled by the glorious weather, beautiful surroundings and kind reception accorded to the Russians by the Japanese.

DIVORCE EVIL.

Episcopal Ministers Issue Important Notice on Matter.

Kansas City, Jan. 14.—The following has been signed by every priest in Kansas in this (Episcopal) diocese of Kansas City:

"We the undersigned clergy, in view of the magnitude of the divorce evil, do hereby give notice to all whom it may concern, that we will not solemnize holy matrimony in any case in which either party has a husband or wife living, who has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage."

German Musician Coming.

GAMBLING IN NEW YORK.

Attorney Jerome Announces His Purpose to Suppress It.

New York, Jan. 13.—Frightened by the activity of Dist. Atty. Jerome, who has announced that he intends, if possible, to suppress gambling in New York, hundreds of card sharps are preparing to leave the city. Many of them plan to go to Hot Springs, Ark., and other winter resorts. Police Commissioner McAdoo has joined in the crusade, and several police rooms were closed to the police today and their operators arrested.

LIVED IN THE TRENCHES.

Gen. Nadien Tells Story of Siege of Port Arthur.

Tokio, Jan. 14.—Lieut. Gen. Nadien, who is one of the Russian officers who gave their parole at Port Arthur and who has arrived here, is 55 years old. He said to an interviewer:

"When I entered Port Arthur I was a major-general. Since then I have been promoted to the rank of lieutenant-general and commanded the fourth division during the siege. I lived in the trenches. The bravery shown by the Japanese navy is beyond comparison. Its achievements are unparalleled. With the Japanese navy and the Russian

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army nothing in the whole world could withstand us. Our soldiers are uneducated—it is not so with the Japanese. The bravery displayed by the Japanese soldiers is unrivaled. It seems shameful to kill such splendid men. I lament the tremendous sacrifice of life on both sides.

"The emperor is a good sovereign. He seems to be disgusted at the cruelties of the war. I wish for peace. I think hostilities will cease during the coming autumn at least."

CITIZENSHIP OF AMERICAN WOMEN.

Washington, Jan. 14.—The Philippine railroad bill was sent to conference with Messrs. Lodge, Hale and Culberson in conference.

The senate began consideration of the bill regulating the restoration to citizenship of American women who have married foreigners.

Mr. Nelson said that the bill was intended to apply to women of this country who married abroad and who were divorced or whose husbands may have died.

Mr. Depew said that it was not the intention of the bill to confine it to widows and divorcees, but to all women who have foreign husbands. The woman suffragists and the ladies of the American League, he said, took exception to the fact that women lost their citizenship by marrying a foreigner, while men did not.

Mr. Lodge suggested an amendment confining the operation of the bill to widows and lawfully divorced women.

Mr. Tillman protested against the amendment as discriminating against married women.

Mr. Depew defended international marriages as natural and due to the "good, old-fashioned American reason of propriety. My observation is, he added, that the bill generally chases the girl, and not the girl the title."

The amendment was accepted.

Mr. Heyburn suggested and Mr. McCumber offered an amendment requiring women taking advantage of the provisions of the proposed law to renounce all titles of nobility which they may have acquired, and it was agreed to.

BOTTLE AS A WEAPON.

Saloon Man Uses It With Driving Force on a Robber's Jaw.

There is a bold robber somewhere hereabouts who is nursing a badly injured jaw. The reason therefor is that the aforesaid jaw came in sudden and painful contact with a bottle filled with beer, thrown with great force and unerring aim by Clem Bagley, proprietor of the Lagoon saloon, 38 north Third West, about 1 o'clock this morning.

At that time, two men, heavily masked and armed with revolvers, entered Bagley's saloon, and commanded those present to throw up their hands. Bagley was seated near a table around which were several men playing cards. Bagley was about to close up the place and go home. He had a bottle of beer in his hand, and when he saw the robbers and the guns, he jumped up quickly and hurled the bottle at the man who seemed to be the leader. The bottle landed on the robber's jaw, and the latter staggered back in a manner not exactly graceful. The other robber then paid his compliments to Bagley by firing a shot at him, which barely missed his mark.

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POULTRY EXHIBIT.

Officers of the Association Promise
Spendid Show This Year.

The officers of the Poultry association are pleased with the prospects for a good exhibition, as they report that a better class of birds has been entered than usual, and there will be no poor or scrubby lots. Last year, for \$2 entry fee, an exhibitor could enter as many birds as he saw fit, and consequently some exhibitors ran their number up as high as 40 birds. However, this year, 50 cents is charged for the entry of each bird, and this has brought about a much needed reform.

Special prizes are offered for school children presenting the best drawings of chickens and judging from specimens already sent in, the school children are likely to be well represented in their efficiency in this class of artistic work. Then, this year, the prizes are in cash, instead of colored ribbons, which is stirring up growers to send in their birds.
