It is true they are not all total abstainers in either body, nor are they all church members. The Idea I intended to convey was that 'Mormon' legislators being all members of their Church are naturably under greater re-Church are naturally under greater re-straint and more careful in their con-duct than members of a legislature who have no church affiliations. Speaking for the members of my own county, as well as all others with whom I am ac-quainted in the present legislature, they are as fine a body of men morally as may be found in any legislative body."
