CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 28.—Hill speaks in

favor of gold and silver as the only

legal tender and said he was opposed

to the part of the amendment of

the Senate from Delaware which

accepted greenbacks in payment

of custom duties. However, the

amendment was in circulation he

would not vote against the bill.

Morrill opposed the bill.

Blaine announced that he would

vote against the bill because he found

no harm in it.

After further discussion the

amendment of Bayard was rejected—

yeas 15, nays 42.

Matthews submitted the following

as a substitute for the House bill

"That whenever any United States

legal tender notes are returned to

the Treasury they shall be released

from time to time as the exigencies

of the public service may require, and

the Secretary of the Treasury shall

not issue any of the same, and it is

provided that nothing herein shall

preclude the issue of such notes as

may be authorized by law, and that

nothing herein shall be construed to

operate as a repeal of any law now

in force, or to prevent the issue of

any other notes or coins which may

be authorized by law." The bill was

passed by yeas 15, nays 42.

The House committee on Indian

affairs authorized Throckmorton to

prepare and report to the House,

with the report of the committee, a

resolution directing the committee

on Indian affairs to visit the Indian

Territory. The principal object of

the commission is to ascertain

whether or not several tribes are desir-

ous of the establishment of the

proposed Territory of Oklahoma.

Immediately after the adjourn-

ment of the House the democratic

members held a caucus for the

purpose of considering the adjourn-

ment sine die of the present session

of Congress. The adjournment

resolution, fixing the 10th of June,

having heretofore been postponed

until the 25th inst. Some of the

members expressed a desire for an

early adjournment, and thought

this could be effected by the 20th

of June, while others were opposed

to making the time so long. The

question of adjournment should, for

the present session, be postponed

until the 10th of June, and the

ture, one being the House bill for

any additional legislation amendatory

of the specie resumption law. There

was, however, an earnest determi-

nation expressed by a number of

democratic representatives in to-

day's caucus, to secure the adoption

by the House of the amendments

to the bill, which would prohibit

the issue of any bonds which shall

prohibit the further sale of bonds to

the syndicate.

Decrease in the Sugar Crop.

HAVANA, 28.—The actual re-

sults of sugar exceed last year's at

Matanzas, Cardenas and Sagua,

while the receipts at Havana are

about 20 per cent less. The stock

of sugar at Havana and Matanzas

is 20,000 tons less than last year. It

is estimated that 500,000 tons have

been made on the whole island.

The yield is now falling off con-

siderably because of the great heat

and rain. The season is much

advanced.

FRANCE.
