



PART IN THE WAR. German Aggression in Africa. LONDON, 3 .- Advices from Camerous state that on December 18th, two German men-of-war arrived at the mouth of the river, and on the 20th the steamers Fan and Dually, which beong to German firms, towed launches containing 300 fully armed men up the river to Heckery. Upon reaching there the German troops opened fire upon the natives, who gathered and returned it. The German troops landed and set fire to the houses of the villagers.
