Six mlies to the north of DeLamar are the Thistle and Bilgaard mines, owned by Mercur and Tintic parties. These claims, under the management of Mr. Adam Burt, are being rapidly developed. Samples of ore brought to town last week rival any ore of that class we have seen for many years. The advent of a railroad into our dis-trict will mean the erection of a smelter to handle the ores of this property. Next week we hope to be able to inform our readers of further rich strikes in the sliver and lead region of this district.
