

NEARLY A HUNDRED PERSONS DROWNED
Two Steamers Running Between Java and Singapore Collide, One Sinking in 2 Minutes.

SIXTY-ONE PERSONS SAVED.
They Were Barely Rescued From a School of Sharks—Rescue Work Thrilling.

Singapore, Nov. 14.—The mail steamer La Seine of the Messageries Maritimes service, running between Java and Singapore, and on her way to this port, collided early this morning with the steamer Onda of the British-India line and sank two minutes later.

Several European passengers, including Baron and Baroness Banckel, the captain of La Seine, five European officers and crew, comprising native passengers and members of the crew, were rescued. The rescue of the crew was practically from the jaws of death, as the Onda, which was a British-India steamer, was a wrecked vessel.

The accident occurred in a thick fog at 10 o'clock in the morning. The La Seine was cut almost in half, and the Onda was cut in two. The two ships were running on a collision course, and the La Seine was struck on the bow.

WIDENERS OF SHEEP HERDERS SLEED GUILTY

San, Wyo., Nov. 13.—Herbert Smith, who Thursday found guilty of murder in the first degree in connection with the killing of Joe Alexander and two other sheepherders in the Teton county last April, was today sentenced to death by Judge C. H. Franklin.

His sentence, however, will be commuted to life imprisonment by Gov. Henry when presentation of a petition which later will be presented by George Salan, accused of being the leader of the cattlemen's raid which killed the sheepherders and Alexander, one of the party, was sentenced to 20 years in the penitentiary as guilty of murder in the second degree.

John and Thomas Dixon, of the party, were sentenced to three years' imprisonment on pleas of guilty of manslaughter.

The plea of guilty and the commutation of Smith's sentence are the result of an agreement between attorneys for the state and defense, by which Smith's life was to be spared provided the other members of the party pleaded guilty to minor charges and agreed to the long and expensive trials.

Charles Furb, who with Alexander, formed state's evidence, and who pleaded guilty, is charged by the state with being the man who fired the shot that killed Alexander.

All of the convicted men, even while they were in the penitentiary, were working hard to save the life of Smith.

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JURY ACQUITS MME. STEINHEIL

Salvo of "Bravos" Followed Announcement of Verdict and Bedlam Broke Loose.

CROWD JUMPED FOR VERY JOY

When Defendant Was Brought in She Swayed and Tittered but Cheering Brought Her Up.

Paris, Nov. 12.—Mme. Margherita Steinheil was acquitted by the jury at 12:15 this morning of murdering her husband, Adolphe Steinheil, a noted painter and her step-mother, Mme. Japy. The verdict was rendered after two and a half hours' deliberation, during which the jury three times summoned the president of the court for explanations, thus proving that the original majority was for conviction.

A dramatic scene followed the jury's appearance.

The red-robed judges and counsel filed in and took their places. M. Devalles, the presiding judge, turned to the jury and asked:

"Have you reached a verdict?"

The foreman replied:

"On our conscience we answer 'no' to every question."

A salvo of "bravos" followed this announcement and perfect bedlam broke loose. M. Aubin, counsel for Mme. Steinheil, embraced his colleagues. Men and women in the rear of the hall jumped and screamed for joy. The judge threatened to clear the courtroom and when a semblance of order was restored he called:

"Bring in the accused."

In two minutes the black-robed figure appeared in the doorway supported on either side by a gendarme. The woman swayed and seemed to be fainting, but in response to a wild outburst of cheers she lifted her head and looked about, smiling faintly in acknowledgment. Then she tottered forward and sank on the floor beside the court.

When the judge pronounced the verdict, her faint murmur of thanks was hardly heard.

An instant later M. Aubin was over the wall lifting her in his arms.

The crowd surged forward, cheering wildly. Outside the gloomy court, tens of thousands who had been waiting for her, took up the cry. After being escorted out of the courtroom Mme. Steinheil was conducted from the building by one of the numerous subterranean passages. Where she was taken out is not known, but probably she was escorted back to St. Lazare prison, as the French procedure requires the formal release of the prisoner.

This ceremony will take place tomorrow.

THREE MEN DROWNED

Marshfield, Or., Nov. 14.—While crossing Coos bay at midnight Saturday a skiff containing four men on their way home from Marshfield to the west side of the bay overturned and Gust Bloom, Otto Agelson and Carl Carlson were drowned.

Norman Back, the fourth member of the party, clung to the bottom of the overturned skiff for half an hour when the capsized boat drifted past the schooner Esther Buhne. Back's cries from his perilous position aroused the crew.

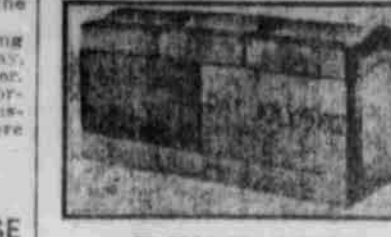
