



STATE FAIR.

The Deseret Agricultural and Manufacturing Society, have the pleasure to announce that their Eighth Annual Exhibition will take place in Great Salt Lake City, commencing on Friday, the 2nd day of October next.

The kindness of President B. Young has placed the Social Hall at our service for this purpose; and it is confidently hoped, from the increasing interest felt throughout the community in domestic manufacture, that the ensuing Exhibition will be made even more than usually interesting.

We, therefore, respectfully invite the people to bring forward their silks, woolsens, cotton and other goods, and every kind of manufactured article, and all the choice productions of the field and the garden, as well as the finest improved stock,—that, seeing what others can do, we may excite a laudable ambition in all that is good and useful.

The Society offers the following extensive list of premiums, to be awarded to successful exhibitors, who are members of the Society, which will be paid in such funds or articles as they may have on hand, or as may be placed at their disposal for this purpose by members of the Board or Society. This list will include a large lot of fresh Madder seed and pure Sugar Cane seed, grown expressly in the Society's grounds for distribution;—also, a large amount of cuttings of the best Apples, Pears, Plums, Peaches, Cherries, Hardy American Grapes of many varieties; also European Grapes, (including the Prize Grapes of 1862 and 1863); Strawberry plants of the largest and best kinds, Raspberries, Blackberries, Currants, and Gooseberries; also, many varieties of Roses, of the finest double ever blooming kinds. There will also be awarded a fine collection of Flower seeds, also some fine Seed Oats and Siberian Wheat, newly imported, and other agricultural seeds. These will be given in addition to the published Books offered in the list of premiums.

All articles intended for competition, except Vegetables, Fruits and Flowers, must be brought to the Clerk of the Fair during Wednesday and Thursday, September 30th and October 1st; the latter may be brought on or before 8 a. m. on Friday, the 1st day of the Fair. The respective Committees will make their awards on the morning of Friday, October 2nd; and the public will be admitted at noon.

The stock will be received at the public yard on Saturday, October 3rd, the second day of the Fair, at 8 a. m., and the premiums will be awarded at noon.

Animals which have taken prizes heretofore will still be eligible for exhibition, and entitled to premiums if successful.

We take this opportunity to invite the people to become members of the Society, by making the annual payment of two dollars, and to remind the members who have not done so for the present year to renew their annual subscription. We, however, recommend as many as are interested to become LIFE MEMBERS of this Society by the single payment of ten dollars, thus avoiding the trouble of an annual payment, and tending better to organize and perpetuate the existence and usefulness of this Society.
