

## THE VOTE OVER THE STATE

That the victory of the Republicans is sure there is no doubt, the small towns, which may cut quite a figure in totals, casting their ballots in line with the remainder of the state. Returns are still incomplete from over the state, but the showing of the two national tickets continue to reflect Republican pluralities.

In all returns, there is a considerable increase in the Socialist vote over the state, particularly in districts where foreign labor figures. The various "American" hybrid tickets are noticeably weak throughout the state, a scattering and small vote only being recorded in the smaller settlements and towns.

Neglect or lack of interest in regard to the questions on the amendment of the state constitution seem to have resulted in a small vote either for or against the proposition. As indicated in the returns so far received from over the state, the vote against them has been exceedingly small.

## BEAVER COUNTY.

GREENVILLE—Republican vote led with 60 for Taft and 36 for Bryan. The Democratic vote for each nominee was 36; the Republican 59 and 60.

## CACHE COUNTY.

HYRUM—The Republican ticket won out at this place with good majorities with one exception, Tingey, 283, against 255 for Owens. Spry polled 187 votes against 279 for Knight and the Republican electors received 300 against 272 and 277. One "American" vote was cast.

MENDON—The entire Republican ticket polled 55 votes for each nominee, against 14 Democratic votes for each nominee.

## CARBON COUNTY.

SCOTFIELD—Scotfield gives the Taft electors 110 votes each and Bryan 110. Nelson with 118 heads his ticket, while Knight polled 130 with 52 for Spry.

PRICE—Taft 205, Bryan 102; Spry 170, Knight 129. The greater part of scratching seems to have been on Spry, for the remainder of the Republican ticket averages ahead of the Democratic ticket. Kitter for sheriff leads his ticket with 170 and Nelson for superintendent of public instruction stands at the Taft electors' figures.

WINTERQUARTERS—Taft (straight) 50, Bryan (straight) 10, Taft (total) 95, Bryan (total) 22; Spry 77, Knight 35; Howell 94, Martineau 20.

CASTLEGATE—Taft 72, Bryan 46, Leggett 3. Republicans cast a majority vote with the exception of Knight 77, Spry 40.

## DAVIS COUNTY.

SYRACUSE—This Davis county settlement went Republican by an average vote of 70 to 56 for the Democrats. Barnes for attorney-general leads his ticket with 71, and on the Democratic side Martineau and Stewart divide honors with 68 votes each.

SOUTH BOUNTIFUL—Taft with 180 and Bryan with 58 is the result in this precinct. Knight polled 63 and Spry 11.

CENTREVILLE—On the national and state tickets Republicans have the majority vote but on the county ticket the Democratic vote is in the majority. Taft 128, Bryan 104, McCarty 120, Stewart 107, Spry 117, Knight 110. Two Socialist votes were cast for McLaughlin and five "American" votes were cast.

KAYSVILLE—This place registered a Democratic majority, Bryan 237, Taft 222, Martineau 358, Howell 239; Stewart 266, McCarty 231, Knight 259; Spry 228. Eight Socialist votes were cast and one "American."

## EMERY COUNTY.

CLEVELAND—Taft 89, Bryan 75; Spry 70; Knight 75.

HUNTINGTON—Democratic with a solid majority. Bryan polling 115 against Taft's 77 and Leggett's 25. Martineau 120, Howell 73, Stewart 116, McCarty 80, Knight 128, Spry 85 and the Democratic majorities down the ticket. The Socialist vote in this place has increased from four at the last election to 25.

## IRON COUNTY.

SUMMIT—Taft 34, Bryan 8; Knight 7, Spry 24.

PARAGONAH—Results are more than close here. Sevy and Holbrook drew 61 each and Cohn 63, as Taft electors, while Stephens drew 64, Nebeker 65, and Andrus 65 for Bryan. Knight leads Spry with 66 to 64.

CEDAR CITY—Taft 231, Bryan 135; Spry leads Knight with 230 to 201. A. C. Nelson leads his ticket with 311, and Knight and Owen stand with the same figures, 201.

## JUAB COUNTY.

MAMMOTH—District No. 1 gives the Democratic column an average of 75 votes over the Republican. Knight with 180 is high man with Thomas Sevy next highest with 122.

LEVAN—Taft 171, Bryan 75; Spry 154, Knight 88. McCarty leads his ticket and Knight is high man on his.

## VOTE FOR DAVIS

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## MILLARD COUNTY.

HOLDEN—Taft with 56 and Bryan 51 shows the average result here. Knight polled 45 and Spry, 81.

OAK CITY—Taft 49, Bryan 42; Spry 42, Knight 50. Tingey and Nelson are high men with 61 votes on each.

KANOSHI—With Judges still counting the ballots, Spry and his ticket seem to be in the lead. Scratching was heavy.

MEADOW—Taft 74, Bryan 45; Spry 74; Knight 54.

FILLMORE—The entire registered vote was polled here Tuesday, giving Taft 241, Bryan 164; Spry 260, Knight 163.

HINCKLEY—Taft 80, Bryan 83; Knight 90, Spry 67.

LEAMINGTON—Taft 47, Bryan 29; with like Republican majority down the ticket. Spry 37, Knight 35.

## MORGAN COUNTY.

PETERSON—Taft 44, Bryan 23; Debs 30; Spry 30, Knight 21, Bohman 37; Howell 36, Martineau 21, Crane 31. Consolidation of schools, 64 for and 17 against.

## SUMMIT COUNTY.

CASTLE ROCK—Taft leads Bryan by 12 to 15 in this district, the same vote obtaining for Spry and Knight. In county and precinct elections the result is the same as to party, scratching not having affected general results.

KAMAS—Taft 74, Bryan 15; Spry 71, Knight 40.

PEOA—Howell led his ticket with 78 against Martineau's 27. Taft, 75; Bryan, 30; Spry, 72, and Knight, 33.

HIENEFER—Taft 139, Bryan 23; Spry 127; Knight 29; Howell 134, Martineau 24.

ROCKPORT—Bryan 35, Taft 18; Martineau 34, Howell 18; Stewart 35, McCarty 17, and down the ballot in the same ratio.

## SANPETE.

GUNNISON—The Republicans were given big pluralities in this precinct. With the Taft electors lead, 84 behind the Bryan poll, Knight's total was 97 and Spry landed 139. McCarty with 202 beat Stewart, whose vote was 85.

EPHRAIM—With 493 for Taft and 367 for Bryan, the Republican poll outstrips the Democratic all down the line. Knight stands at 419 with Spry drawing 432.

FOUNTAIN GREEN—Went Republican by a large majority. Jewkes led his ticket with 256 against Nixon's 48. Taft 245, Bryan 54; Howell 245, Martineau 56; McCarty 245, Stewart 54; Spry 238, Knight 60, which led Democratic ticket in that place. Five Socialist votes were cast.

MT. PLEASANT—Taft 490, Bryan 505; Knight 412, Spry 354, Howell 441, Martineau 550; "American" votes 21.

FAIRVIEW—Taft 353, Bryan 201; Spry 333, Knight 278, Howell 355, Martineau 205.

MORONI—Taft 243, Bryan 219; Spry 222, Knight 228; Howell 238, Martineau 223.

MANTI—Taft 534, Bryan 330, Spry 478, Knight 373, Howell 516, Martineau 338.

CENTERFIELD—Taft 87, Bryan 9.

SPRING CITY—Republicans carried this place by a small majority. Taft led the ticket with 212 against Bryan's 190, Howell 198 against Martineau 183, Stewart and Knight polled 198 and 207 respectively against 195 and 187 for the Republican nominees.

FAVETTE—Taft 76, Bryan 9; Spry 74, Knight 10.

CHESTER—Taft led with 63, Spry with 61, Howell with 64, Bryan with 21 with the rest of the Democratic ticket in like ratio.

## SEVIER COUNTY.

SALINA—Taft 262, Bryan 132; Howell 201; Martineau 126; McCarty 208; Stewart 129; Spry 179; Knight 162. The entire Republican ticket at Salina showed a majority in the like ratio.

VERMILION—Taft 49, Bryan 19; Spry 49, Knight 21; Howell 50, Martineau 19.

MONROE—Republicans polled a small majority. Taft 237, Bryan 221; Knight received 289 votes to Spry's 192; Howell 237, Martineau 219; McCarty 255, Stewart 248.

## TOOELE COUNTY.

The total vote in this county stands as follows: Taft, 1,070; Bryan, 789; Howell, 1,049; Martineau, 785; Spry, 912; Knight, 879.

ERDA—Nelson led his ticket with 52, the Democratic nominee polling 8; Taft 49, Bryan 11, Spry 45, against Knight's 16, which led the Democratic ticket at this place.

LAKEPOINT—Taft 42, Bryan 25 and a like ratio down the ballot. Two "American" votes were cast.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY.

ENTERPRISE—Taft 49, Bryan 39; Spry 46; Knight 42.

## WASATCH COUNTY.

WALLSBURG—The Republican ticket polled on an average of two votes to the Democrats one. Taft led with 101, Bryan 56, Howell 101, Martineau 57, McCarty and Spry, 101, against 57 and 71 Democratic votes. The rest of the ticket followed in like ratio.

WOODLAND—Taft 30, Bryan 7; Spry 27, Knight 10.

HEBER—Taft 908, Bryan 756.

## WEBER COUNTY.

OGDEN—With several county districts to be heard from indications are that the Republican majority will be about 1,200. The results from Morgan and Davis counties together with Weber county give Judge Howell a majority over C. C. Richards of 1,208. The entire fight was between the above candidates and the fight was probably one of the hardest fought that there has been in the county in its political history.

According to the figures prepared by Republican Chairman Oscar Madison, the state and county tickets have 1,200 plurality and the Taft electors have 1,500 majority in Weber county. The complete county returns outside of the city have not been obtained at present on account of the fact that many of the judges of election sealed and signed a duplicate list. The full returns will not be known until next Monday, when the board of county commissioners will canvass the returns.

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In Ogden City the vote polled in 17 precincts was 6,322, while four years ago only 3,973 votes were polled in the city and a total of 6,232 in the entire county. In the county this year 2,350 (estimated) were cast. The plurality for the Republican county ticket in Weber county this year is 200 less than what it was two years ago.

HOOPER—District No. 2 gives results somewhat split. The Republican vote tallies slightly over the Democratic. Howell for judge leads his ticket with 16, while Beus, for short term commissioner, polled 21.

## UTAH COUNTY.

PROVO—The election returns from the county are not yet complete, and probably will not be fully known till the official count, next Monday. So far as reported Provo has given 1,561 for Taft electors against 1,250 for Bryan electors. Spry for governor, received 1,148 votes against 1,023 for Knight. In the county 46 districts out of 54 show the following vote.

Republican electors, 5,783; Demo-

cratic electors, 4,805; Howell, (R.) for Congress, 5,631; Martineau (D.) for Justice of the supreme court, 5,643; Stewart (D.), 4,550; Spry (R.) for governor, 4,790; Knight (D.) for governor, 5,468.

Legislative Ticket—Republicans, 5,540; Democrats, 4,652.

All the Republican county officers are elected, with the exception of superintendent of schools, George N. Child (D.) who was elected by about 200 majority over Carl Hopkin (R.).

Booth, (R.) for judge of the Fourth judicial district has 5,343 votes in the county, so far as reported and Corfman (D.) has 4,365. Chaff, (R.) for district attorney, 5,390, against 4,326 for Morgan (D.).

So far as heard from, Wasatch and Uintah counties (the other counties in the district) are for Booth and Chaff.

PAYSON—A strong Republican majority was registered at this place. Taft polled 464 and Bryan 348. The closest fight was between Spry and Knight. Spry led by four votes, having pulled 412 against Knight's 308. Otherwise the solid majority for Taft was general down the ticket.

## RESULTS IN IDAHO.

The vote in Idaho's smaller towns is scattering, scratching having been general in almost every settlement. Voting for Brady, many scratch Hamer and place their ballot with McClear and many who voted for Alexander have also voted for Hamer.

Generally, in smaller towns the Republican ticket showed greater strength than the Democratic. In Rexburg, where the fight was hotly contested in every feature, the result shows strongly for the entire Republican ticket. Local bonding questions and questions on amendments to the state constitution played an important part in the election from the standpoint of the legislature's next session and county policy, though in all cases there seems to have been a peculiar neglect on the part of voters to ballot on these questions.

## FREMONT COUNTY.

ST. ANTHONY—Taft 165, Bryan 84, Brady 55, Alexander 15; Hamer 105, McClear 94.

REXBURG—(Island Ward Precinct), Taft 83, Bryan 51; Brady 72, Alexander 69; Hamer 73, McClear 67. The hardest fought election ever held in Fremont county, terminated in a victory for the Republican party. Rexburg was the principal battle ground of the county, and the feeling between the two parties was intense.

The Democrats made their fight and founded all their hopes on a howl which they set up as to extravagance of the present Republican administration, and resorted to much trickery in furthering their cause. While some people were won over this side by misrepresentation, they were, however, not able to win enough votes to elect a single man on their county ticket. The Republicans making the most hotly contested precinct in the county, the votes were more equally divided than elsewhere.

The vote in the three precincts of Rexburg was as follows: Taft 131, Bryan 93; Brady 120, Alexander 102; Hamer 125, McClear 87.

## STUDENTS TALK STRIKE

Sequel to Hair-Cutting Incident at University and Suspension of the Culprit Responsible.

All Afternoon yesterday the engineering society held council trying to decide to "do or not to do," regarding the action of the faculty upon the election day hair cutting scrape. The day before election the engineers met and declared a holiday and agreed as a body not to attend any class on election day. It was further agreed that if one of their number should attend a class, he should be given a hair cut free of all charge.

However in the face of all the dire calamities that were in store for him, a sophomore Borgquist, saw fit to attend a class in Physics. As he passed out of the Physical Science building at the close he was stopped by a crowd of his fellows, who proceeded to seize him and administer the prescribed punishment. The first man to lay hands on him Henry Richardson, was rapped over the head with a club which Borgquist had up his sleeve. He was overpowered, however, by the conspirators and given the hair cut, another sophomore Loubourou, handling the shears.

After it was over Borgquist complained to the faculty, maintaining that if he wished to attend a class on election day or Christmas it was no body's business. The discipline committee met and suspended Loubourou for one week.

Then up rose the engineers as one man saying, "Loofie" is no more to blame than the rest of us. If he goes we go. A meeting was called yesterday at 1 o'clock p. m., lasting until 4:30. It was decided that the engineers would meet with Loubourou, who in walked President Kingsbury and the discipline committee. Then there was consternation. The engineers, however, voted to stand by Loubourou and ask the discipline committee to reconsider the case with all the engineers present as culprits. The committee retired a few minutes and Chairman Bennion made the following report:

We propose to abide by our previous decision. "We believe that this affair was not a punishment for assault and battery, but done in an attitude of menace and threat. It is a case where a body of students has tried to decide what the faculty number should be. A state institution should stand for moral and civil law and if we have mob law, it is not the thing for which the college was founded."

It seemed for a moment that an outbreak would occur resulting in a general walkout. A motion was made to drop the matter, but was voted down. After considering the interest of the football team which contains several engineers it was decided to defer the matter until the discipline committee had made further action.

Prof. Bennion left last night for Cedar City where he will lecture tonight to the students of the Branch Normal school. Friday evening he will lecture in St. George and on Saturday he will conduct the institute of Washington county teachers.
