

## MALAD STAKE CONFERENCE.

## L. D. S. COLLEGE.

The News representative paid a brief visit to the Latter-day Saints' college on First North street on Friday, and listened to recitations in German, English literature and algebra, conducted by Professor Haug, Principal Done and Professor Nelson, respectively. While the visit was very brief, an impression was given of earnest and thorough preparation on the part of the teacher and its inevitable result upon the student. This institution is fully and satisfactorily fulfilling its mission.

## KINDERGARTEN SCHOOLS.

The Eighteenth ward kindergarten school opened Sept. 18, with an enrollment of sixteen. Miss Emeline Wells, formerly connected with Miss Goodrich, is the teacher, and is building up an excellent school.

Misses Sharp and Woodmansee opened a kindergarten school on Monday, Sept. 18, in the vestry of the Twentieth ward meeting house, corner of Second and D streets, and have twenty-three little folks in attendance, with prospects of thirteen more.

The kindergarten department of Rowland Hall Academy opened Sept. 1892, Miss Robinson, graduate of the Educational Department, Toronto, teacher. Miss Robinson is assisted by Miss Donnelly, twenty-three pupils being on the register. The room was neatly adorned with articles made by the children, beautiful in design and requiring much skill and application in execution.

The free kindergarten school under the auspices of St. Mark's church opened Sept. 5th, and now has an enrollment of seventeen. It is in charge of Miss Durant, who is assisted by Miss Morf. Miss Durant is a graduate of the San Francisco training school, and brings excellent qualifications to her new position.

The first kindergarten school under the auspices of the Salt Lake Kindergarten association was organized in January, 1893, with an enrollment of thirty-seven pupils. Miss Goodrich, a pupil of Miss Treat's famous school at Grand Rapids, Mich., was engaged as teacher, and is continuing the school the present year. She is assisted in her work by Mrs. Brunton, pianist, and by Miss Briggs.

The kindergarten department of the Utah Normal college was opened September 5th, and now registers twenty pupils. The school is in charge of Miss Jeannette Smith, of Saltsburg, Colo.
