JEWISH MASSACRE IN RUSSIAN POLAND

Was Carefully Planned, Soldiers Warning All Christians to Hang Out Their Ikons.

200 KILLED, 1.000 WOUNDED.

Stores Pillaged and Selling of Loot Openly Countenanced By Army Officers.

No Steps Taken to Prevent Outrages-Many Buildings in Siedlee, Scene of Horror, Are on Fire.

Siedler, Sept. 10.-A Jewish massacre, surpassing in seriousness all previous ones in this vicinity, took place here Saturday and Sunday. It was carefulty planted beforehand, the soldiers naming all of the Christian population in signce to hang out their ikons so that they might remain undisturbed. seight night some Terrorists killed in soldiers, and thereupon the Libau stment broke forth in unrestrained hrs. They began murdering Jews on ner hand and continued their work d slaughter all night Saturday and ill day Sunday. The ghastly work of all day Sunday. The ghastly work of numering and pillaging continued un-diarly this morning, when Gov.-Gen. Smilen telegraphed for permission to use the artillery. Four batteries then the down Pienkna, Warsaw and dened fire down Plenkna, warsaw and Allena streets, which were inhabited by thousands of Jews. The destruction was horrible. As a result of the gen-eril slaughter, it is estimated that fully 50 Jews have been killed and 1.000 wounded. There are 3.000 prisoners in custody, a great many of whom are nonnded. Not a soldier was killed. This morning a squad of soldiers were parading through the streets selling parading through the streets setting pilaged watches and jeweiry. The army efficers openly countenariced the selling of loct. The local governor, Englie, took no steps to prevent the outrage.

To prevent the outrages, the tele-raph offices are closed, and no per-sons are allowed to leave the town. The refugees continue to crowd the sta-tions. The soldiers are drunk and behaving with extraordinary brutality. SIEDLCE ON FIRE.

Siedice, Sept. 10. - Six buildings in the big bazar of the city are now in fames, adding another terror to the killing and plundering which have been going on here for 36 hours.

Warsaw, Sept. 10 .- Artillery was used in Siedice this morning. Buildings on Pinkna, Warsaw and Aléina streets have been destroyed. According to re-ports received here 200 Jews were kilied and 3,000 were wounded during the Dogrom.

A telegram received here from Siedlee this morning says the rioting and shooting there continue. The revolu-tionists are firing at the soldiery from windows and the troops reply with vol-leys. The Libau infantry regiment took the principal part in the massacre. Some passengers on a through train were hit by stray shots on Sunday. The loot offered for sale by the soldiers consists principally of jewelcy and clothing.

The town is without adequate fire service, and by the time the small hose was played on the flames, the fire was beyond control. While the negro was crying out in his agony after the last attempt at his rescue, one of the walls of the jail fell in and he was buried beneath the debris.

255 PERSONS BURIED ALIVE

Fifty-Two Bodies Recovered-**Countless Heads of Cattle** Perished.

The Great Avalanche of Earth Broke Loose Without Warning and Swept Down With Disastrous Force.

Tiflis, Sept. 10 .- Practically without warning the side of a mountain rising above the township of Kwareli broke away and a sea of semi-liquid sand, stones and mud swept down on the township and overwhelmed and oblits erated it. Some 255 persons have been buried alive, Fifty-five bodies already have been recovered from the mire. which is six feet deep. In addition to the lives lost, countless head of cattle perished and the crops were destroyed. Kwareli township occupies an area of five kilometers of the district of Telaw, in the Caucasus, Similar disasters are common occurrences in Caucasian valleys.

RUSSIA EXPRESSES REGRET FOR ATTACK ON CONSUL.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 10 .- The British embassy has received expressions of the government's regret for the attack in Baku, Sept. 8, upon Leslie Urguhart, the Brittsh vice consul, and assurances that everything would be done to discover and punish the perpetrators of the act.

Sir Arthur Nicholson, the ambassador, believes the attack upon Mr. Urguhart to have been of a semi-political nature and committed by agitators who have been endeavoring to engineer another outbreak among the workmen in the oil industry. Any person seen leaving a house or looking out of a window was shot without mercy.

ARTILLERY OPENED FIRE.

Warsaw, Sept. 10 .- Acording to the atest advices received here from Sidlee the artillery opened fire at 8 sclock this morning. The cannon shots were directed against the buildings from which the terrorists had fired on the soldiers. The sound of the big runs sent a number of women into a state of hysterical fear. Over 150 Jew-th shops were looted. Christians escaped the massacre by hanging holg images and crosses to their windows. The soldiers got quite out of hand. MASSACRE PREDICTED.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 10,--The predictions made in these dispatches on Aug. 3, of a Jewish massacre at Seidlee, Russian Poland, unhappliy have been lastified by the fighting which broke out Saturday night and developed yes-terday into a carnival of indiscriminate slaughter and pillage in which the sol-Bary and the mob took part. sociates in Germany. The ceremony took place in a board-ing house and Rev. Dr. McWilliams of Ossining Presbyterian church officlatied. A civil ceremony, it was an-nounced, had been performed in Germany two years ago. The count is a son of Count Bolke von

Hochberg of Rohnstock in Silesia and superintendent of the royal opera in Berlin, His mother was Princess Christine von Schanach-Caraloth, a cousin of Crown Princess Cecilia. Young von Herchberg attended the Bloen military college and was appoint-ed to the first regiment of German foot after his graduation. He was constantly at court. He was head usher at the crown prince's wedding in

June, 1905. During his career in Berlin the count met Miss Carow who was a clerk in a glove store and an attachment followed. To break this he was sent to America. in New York he stayed for a while at the Hotel Empire as "Mr. Graf," but soon assumed his real name. He obtained employment as a chauffeur in Tarrytown. Recently the count cabled for Miss Carow to join him. The Ger-man authorities tried to prevent her from leaving Germany and afterward from landing here.
