## MRS. THAW WILL CONTINUE FIGHT

She Sells Part of Her Famous Lyndhurst to Provide Money With Which to Carry it on.

## HARRY NOT VERY SURPRISED

Read Justice Mills' Adverse Decision And Made Comments on The Same.

Pittsburg, Aug. 12.—Proof that Mrs. William Thaw is not yet done fighting for her son was given yesterday when she disposed of a portion of the front lawn of the famous Lyndhurst to W. W. Willock, the consideration being cash and in the neighborhood of \$100,000. The property is 250 by 600 feet and is one of the most beautiful tracts in the resident parts of Pittsburg.

Some time ago Mrs. Thaw's agent was instructed to cast about for a purchaser for some of her property in case of sudden call. It was understood that the call would not be made if Harry K. Thaw were liberated from Matteawan. Before noon yesterday there came orders to close the deal and Mr. Willock, who is a steel king, took up the property.

It was but recently that Mrs. Thaw borrowed \$100,000 on Lyndhurst. At the time the orders came to sell the property, work was stopped on the interior of the Thaw home, which was being fitted up for the reception of Harry. At noon the workmen were all discharged.

### THAW RECEIVES NEWS.

White Plains, N. Y., Aug. 12.—Harry K. Thaw received the news today of the failure of his second attempt to obtain discharge from Matteawan with but slight display of excitement. His manner indicated that he had expected an adverse decision. The information was brought him first in his cell in the local jail by the Associated Press representative.

"Have you heard Justice Mills' decision?" he was asked.

"No," said Thaw, without moving from his chair.

A copy of the court's opinion was handed to him. He read it rapidly and without comment until he came to the following sentence:

"If those beliefs constituted delusions in his mind when he committed the homicide they are the same now."

"That's not so," he said, and marked the lines with his pencil.

As to his future plans, he referred questioners to his attorney.

Thaw's attorney, Charles Morschauer, was not in town this morning when the decision was rendered. Some of the prisoner's family could be found. At their hotel it was said they had looked themselves in their rooms and given orders that no one be admitted.

### THAW'S STATEMENT.

Early today, before the decision was announced, Thaw gave out the following statement:

This statement from Thaw came indirectly from the jail physician, Dr. William J. Meyers. Thaw told him, Dr. Meyers said, that while he was disappointed by Justice Mills' decision, he had no intention of giving up the fight. "I am determined to make my final effort to get a trial by jury," said Thaw. "Many things have been done in this case that should not have been done, and much has been left undone. But I have been in the hands of my counsel throughout."

Dr. Meyers said Thaw was taking the matter calmly and seemed in no danger of a breakdown.

### THE MOTHER'S STATEMENT.

Mrs. Harry Copley Thaw tonight made the following statement:

"Let no one imagine for a moment on reading this opinion of Judge Mills that it means a victory for the district attorney of New York. Every prop was taken from under that arrogant, vindictive persecutor of a sane acquitted man."

"So baffled was he that when he rose to make his closing speech (for argument it was not) he had more the appearance of a schoolboy compelled to say his piece than that of a man of courageous, mature sophist who dominates the courts of his own judicial district except when wealthy malefactors are under trial."

"This totally unexpected and cruel decision of the trial judge must remain a mystery."

"Meanwhile my son, my daughter and I have no alternative but to take up again the burden I had every reason to believe was behind us forever."

## AMERICA HAS GOOD BUSINESS CHANCES IN CHINA

New York, Aug. 13.—William W. Rockhill, who sails today to assume new duties as ambassador to Russia, declared that America has remarkably good commercial prospect in China where he has been minister since 1905.

"The Chinese are very friendly with us and are anxious to strengthen the business relationship now existing," said Mr. Rockhill. "The building of railroads will open up the interior of China to a vast foreign commerce of which America can have the largest part of it if it will go after it. England, Germany and France have enjoyed the largest part of Chinese commerce because they have established houses there and have done business in a progressive manner. The United States and China has been that our manufacturers and merchants have been satisfied with a representation there by a professional agent."

"We can sell better goods in China and at a less cost than any other nation and in a progressive manner. The country will be opened by railroads, the American business man will take advantage of the friendliness of China."

Mr. Rockhill anticipated no unusual international complications during his coming stay in Russia.

## STRIKING PRINTER KILLS TWO MEN

Bisbee, Ariz., Aug. 13.—William Frankuch, a striking printer, shot and killed Asa T. Hoy, former business manager of the Review, a morning paper of this city, and William Rodole of Covington, Ky., early today. Union printers on the Review struck several days ago, and Hoy and Rodole were operating the linotype machines in their places.

## THE MARLBOROUGH.

Rumored That Duke and Duchess Are About to Become Reconciled.

Chicago, Aug. 13.—A special cable from London to the Tribune says: It is rumored that the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough are about to become reconciled owing to the intervention of friends, among whom Mrs. Anthony Drexel is prominently mentioned.

The reunion should it be effected, will not come as a surprise as it has been noticed that the duke and duchess have been meeting lately more frequently than would seem likely to a case of continued estrangement.

The duchess is now at their country place in Devonshire, in which country the duke is said to be visiting.

## HUNDRED STUDENTS DROPPED FROM CHICAGO UNIVERSITY

Chicago, Aug. 13.—Too much attention to social duties and too little to class work resulting in dropping of almost 100 young men from the ranks of the University of Chicago yesterday. The freshmen of the school were hardest hit, 75 of them being dropped.

In a report President Judson declared that a large number of university students spent too much time attending social affairs, with a consequent neglect of studies.

## GIANT BELLS RING.

New York, Aug. 13.—Four giant bells in the belfry on the forty-sixth floor of the Metropolitan Life building tower were rung yesterday for the first time and thousands of persons in Madison Square heard chimes which are twice as high as the bells of any other bell in the world. One bell weighing 7,000 pounds, strikes a B flat; one weighing 3,000 pounds is E flat and one of 2,000 pounds is F and one of 1,500 pounds is G.

From now on, they will strike the hour and every quarter hour for the great clock in the tower.

## JUDGE BUSEY DROWNED.

Park Rapids, Minn., Aug. 13.—Judge J. S. Busey of Urbana, Ill., and his daughter Anna, who were on a fishing trip in the middle of Man Trap lake yesterday while fishing.

On account of the absence of pole and lines, one of which was later recovered unhooked in reeds at the far end of the lake, it is believed that they had caught a fish, which entwined their line, to disentangle which they moved about in the boat, capsizing it.

## FISH TRAPS.

Dr. David Starr Jordan Does Not Favor Their Abolishment.

Seattle, Aug. 12.—"The report that I favored the abolishment of fish traps is incorrect. To begin with, fish traps must be used in this country's waters," said Dr. David Starr Jordan of the international fisheries commission, who has been investigating conditions affecting the sockeye salmon now running in lower Puget Sound, in an interview last night.

"What I do favor and what I will urge is some sort of proper regulation of fishing so that there will not be large catches one year and then a big falling off for three years."
